87th Annual Meeting

All Cathedral members are encouraged to attend the Annual Meeting on **Sunday, January 29**.

We will have our regular worship services that morning—Rite I at 8am, and Rite II and Children’s Church at 10:30am. The Annual Meeting will follow the 10:30am worship service.

As in the past, St. Monica’s Guild will provide brunch. High chairs and booster seats are available in the Great Hall.

Nursery care will be provided until the meeting adjourns.

What happens at the Annual Meeting?

- The Chapter provides the proposed 2017 budget for congregational approval.
- Those present elect delegates to the October 2017 Diocesan convention.
- Those present elect four persons to the Chapter.
- Annual Reports from Finance, Trust & Endowment, guilds, standing committees and staff are presented.

Most of the Annual Reports will be available a week prior to the meeting.

We currently have six candidates for four openings on the Chapter; see page 5 for information about them.

Reel Theology kicks off again this January!

This year our theme is “A Slice of Life in America,” and specifically we will watch films that look at issues of race and identity through a variety of lenses and experiences.

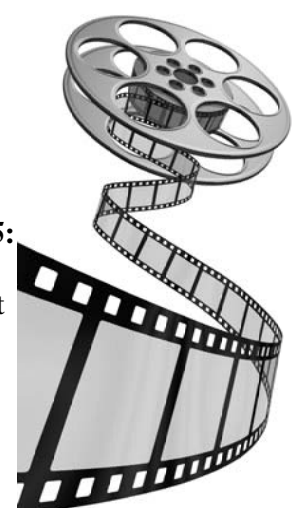
January 25: *The Namesake* (PG-13) The story of the Ganguli family whose move from Calcutta to New York evokes a lifelong balancing act to meld to a new world without forgetting the old. Though parents Ashoke and Ashima long for the family and culture that enveloped them in India, they take great pride in the opportunities their sacrifices have afforded their children.

February 1: *13th* (TV-MA) is a 2016 American documentary by director Ava DuVernay. Centered on race in the United States criminal justice system, the film is titled after the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, which outlawed slavery.

February 8: *Dear White People* (R) A social satire that follows the stories of four black students at an Ivy League college where controversy breaks out over a popular but offensive black-face party thrown by white students. With tongue planted firmly in cheek, the film explores racial identity in acutely-not-post-racial America while

weaving a universal story of forging one’s unique path in the world.

February 15: *Zootopia* (PG) From the largest elephant to the smallest shrew, the city of Zootopia is a mammal metropolis where various animals live and thrive. When Judy Hopps becomes the first rabbit to join the police force, she quickly learns how tough it is to enforce the law. Determined to prove herself, Judy jumps at the opportunity to solve a mysterious case. Unfortunately, that means working with Nick Wilde, a wily fox who makes her job even harder.

From the Dean

Over the past couple of weeks I have seen a few editorials declaring that 2016 was a terrible year, and hoping that 2017 would be better. Certainly 2016 was a bad year for the people of Aleppo and most of Syria. It was a bad year for the people of Mother Emmanuel Church, and it was a bad year—in a few cases a really bad year—for some of the members of our Cathedral family. I suppose as well it was a bad year for people who—like me—are concerned about the prospect of Donald Trump being president. I don't want to minimize any of the sadness and tragedy that befell folks in 2016, but as I look back on it I can't see why it should be identified as a particularly bad year overall. On the contrary, it seems to me that 2016, taken as a whole, was not a lot different from any other year. 2016 was chock full of heartbreak, and it was full of great joy. It was a year of triumph, and it was a year of disaster, just like every other year. The collective human tendency is to imagine that our moment is somehow unique, that this time right now is more important than other times. That is hardly ever true, and I don't think it is true now. The greater likelihood is that 2016 will appear less and less remarkable as the decades go by. I hope so anyway; there is a great blessing to living in unremarkable times.

But if over the next century or two 2016 comes to be seen as a pivotal moment in human history, it will probably be for completely different reasons than the pundits are now identifying as crucial. Two thousand years ago or so if you had asked what was the most important event of that year, it is certain that no one important, no one wise, no

one with any influence would have identified the birth of a baby in an obscure backwater of the Roman Empire. The talk instead would have been of foreign wars, grain production, the latest activities of Augustus, big things that, then as now, grab all the attention and consume most of the emotional energy.

Yet the truth is that big things are always happening, and although they change the power structures within societies, and sometimes change which society will dominate the other, they don't change the fundamental experience or perceptions of humanity as a whole. That happens only in the unnoticed events, when the unseen, not noted, presence of the Divine infects the human heart and produces what Paul called "a New Creation." It happens, if you will permit me to change the tense of that most important sentence, as "The Word becomes flesh and dwells among us."

With that thought I leave 2016, a year which appears to me to have been like any other. For like every other year, through all the big moments and great disasters that have led some to call it a bad year, it has more deeply been a time, like all times, in which God has continued through the silences and the unnoticed moments to breath the life of the Risen Christ into the world.

Music at the Cathedral

The Cathedral's celebration of Advent-Christmastide has been particularly rich, from Advent and Lessons & Carols liturgies that expressed our yearning for peace to liturgies that expressed our joy and comfort with the birth of the Christ child. We are grateful for the guest musicians who joined us, from solo harp to chamber orchestra, for enriching our community's music with heartfelt playing. I am grateful to directors Tamara Schupman and Dr. Stan McDaniel for their ministerial leadership of our Junior Choir and Cathedral Ringers: throughout Advent and Christmas, these eager young singers and vibrant ringers have captured each season's character and led us to prayer. Lastly, I am particularly grateful to Dr. John Bodinger, who generously extends himself far beyond his exceptional musical and liturgical skills as organist. On Christmas Eve—a marathon of services and rehearsals from 2pm until after midnight—we heard him as organist, Junior Choir pianist, handbell ringer, and tenor singer. His passion for music and ministry and his inspired playing are gifts to this community. I am professionally and personally grateful for John as a partner at the Cathedral: for your music, steady patience, and sincere care for the people of this community—thank you.

We draw Christmastide to a close with our vibrant celebration of Epiphany on **January 8**. The anthems recognize God's revelation to all people by coming from two distinct traditions: Shawn Kirchner's arrangement of "Brightest and Best" is set in Appalachian bluegrass style, with fiddle (David Armstrong) and upright bass (Joshua Vander Plaats), while Sir William Walton's "Make we joy now in this fest" uses an medie-

val macaronic text, alternating Latin and English.

The Cathedral will open its doors to children of the Spokane community through Spokane Public Radio's **KPBX Kids Concert on Saturday, January 28 at 1pm: Kings & Queens: Renaissance Music for Court and Chapel**. The Cathedral Kantorei Choir will sing sacred music originally composed in the 16th century for the Chapel Royal of Queens Mary and Elizabeth, exploring both musical beauty and religious turbulence. Musical romance in the Royal Court will include guitar with solo voice, and madrigals sung by choir will capture courtly jesting and teasing. The performance will also feature our resident carillonneur, Byrl Cinnamon. All are welcome to attend this free concert.

St. John's Cathedral strives to contribute to the broader community and serve as a model and resource for sacred music in the Northwest. As part of this mission, we will host a liturgical music intern from mid-January through May. Andrea Timm, a music major at Gonzaga University, will learn from and contribute to our Cathedral music program through involvement with the Junior Choir, Cathedral Ringers, and Cathedral Choir. One of her special projects will be planning and leading an Evensong service during Lent. In her own words:

I am excited to be at St. John's for the last semester of my senior year. I grew up in Seattle with music ever present in my life and am primarily a vocalist, though I also play piano and guitar and recently began studying organ with Dr. Bodinger. After three semesters as a student assistant for Gonzaga University's Student Mass Ensemble and a semester as director, I look forward to stepping into the Spokane community. I am especial-

ly excited to work with Tamara Schupman and the Junior Choir. It is my hope that my experience at St. John's will help prepare me for a career in liturgical music.

Launching very soon will be a new welcome point for visitors and those thinking about being visitors to the Cathedral. A stand-alone page on our website has been built to host the following opportunities for visitors to engage with the Cathedral:

- A new welcome video that not only welcomes first-time visitors (and those thinking about visiting) but also orients them to the most important pieces of the service so they won't be quite as lost
- A new online visitor information form. This new online form will allow people to be much more specific in what they are interested in learning about, and their requests will be automatically filtered to those people on staff who can help them the most! For example: if we have a new visitor who is interested in the music program, an email will come to myself as the welcome coordinator and also to the music team of Tim and John so they can contact that person directly.
- All of the best links to the other important areas of our Cathedral web-

site!

In addition to these new digital means, we will be refreshing our paper visitor cards to reflect our new interest areas and to help direct visitors in the pews to the welcome video.

This is the first step towards becoming an even more welcoming congregation that is also intentional in trying to make the worship experience as easy as possible for newcomers and in doing so, hopefully encourage growth in our congregation. There are more steps to this process than simply directing people to a video and online form, and we will definitely be working on them this coming spring (keep your eyes peeled for an announcement about an upcoming evangelism training with the curate), but this is a great place to start.

Once we're live, I hope you take an opportunity to check out our new welcome point, provide us with feedback, even fill out the form if you want more information about a specific ministry area. And then, you can help others do the same when they visit St. John's, making a human connection to the congregation as they learn from a digital one.

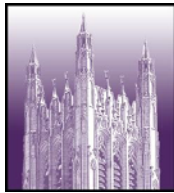

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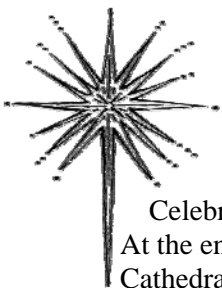
