From the Interim Vicar

It's that time again—the fall season—the time when everything in church, in school and in other parts of our lives gears up. It can feel a bit frantic. There is much to do. Add to that a collection of larger concerns and catastrophes in our nation and world that touch our hearts as we watch the evening news: earthquakes, hurricanes, complicated world politics, plus the aftermath of a shooting at one of our high schools. Our plates are very full, indeed. Our prayer lives are full as well.

I'm always interested in how spiritual practice speaks to times like these. We look beyond ourselves for help. Sometimes we have an informal daily prayer routine. Sometimes we pray morning or evening prayer from our Prayer Book. Sometimes we seek a quiet place for a while or take a walk and listen for God's voice and God's peace amid everything that tugs at our hearts and fills our calendars. We try to find our center as we reflect on what is happening.

I've found the writing of Barbara Brown Taylor helpful at times like these. Taylor, an Episcopal priest and gifted preacher and writer, left parish ministry to teach religion and spirituality at the college level and now lives in rural Georgia.

Her book, *An Altar in the World – A Geography of Faith*, looks at twelve spiritual practices that really grow out of every-day experience as ways to shape our spirituality. Things like paying attention, or saying 'no' or feeling pain or getting lost. These are

very down-to-earth things that we all experience, but don't always think of them as woven into our spiritual life. Some of them are a bit surprising. Most of them have to do with cultivating a new awareness.

I never really thought about "getting lost" as a spiritual practice—getting off the beaten path and into a place we do not know. That can work in a literal way or a more metaphorical way and usually teaches us something. And sometimes it feels like wilderness.

I do know, that when I get lost my awareness is notched up. One time I was following a complex map in Florence, Italy, planning to visit the Pitti Palace. The map was detailed, but not accurate and before long I was lost in a maze of narrow, winding streets. I had no idea where I was. It wasn't dangerous, but it was unnerving.

A woman spotted me as I crossed a street and must have noticed that I seemed to be lost. With her few words of English and my few words of Italian we talked a bit. Then she offered to lead me to my destination—a great relief to me.

As I reflected on that afternoon journey, I realized that my getting lost resulted in making a new friend—a stranger whose kindness I will always remember. It reminded me that being off the straight road took me to some interesting places. It taught me that getting lost was not the worst thing that could have happened to me. And I think it made me more adventurous. I'm much more willing to take a new path, explore a new road, visit a place I've never been before. Of course underneath all of that I knew, in my wandering, that I was also in God's hands.

Sometimes what is going on in the world around us—things over which we have little or no control—can feel a bit like wilderness. It can feel like we are lost. Frankly, being a church in transition can feel like that as well. But it can also be an opportunity to reflect on how we meet God as we enter into new territory—those strange, new places that we share with all of humanity and with whom we are all in God's hands.

(If you would be interested in exploring this book, let me know and perhaps we could create a group.)

Living History

We've built a timeline from the 1930s to the present on the wall in the southeast corner of the room, with a piece of poster board for each decade. Please post some things that you remember or that you believe were significant in the Cathedral's last nearly nine decades and we will all learn a history lesson from one another.

Music at the Cathedral

October at St. John's Cathedral is bookended by two special feasts, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi and the Feast of the Reformation. While neither feast properly falls on a Sunday, we celebrate them in a special way liturgically at the Cathedral.

On October 1, we celebrate God's presence in all creation with the Feast of St. Francis. All are invited to bring animals for a special blessing, and our ritual music gives voice to this through hymnody (Earth and All Stars) and anthems, including John Rutter's **For the Beauty of the Earth**, sung by the combined Junior and Cathedral Choirs. In this liturgy, however, we also recognize the great responsibility to care for God's creation and to pursue simplicity and justice like St. Francis, who cared for lepers and gave away his possessions. We recall the loving source of all creation through a setting of Dante's *Paradiso*, **The Wheel that Moves the Sun and the Stars**, and we go forth with the prayer of St. Francis, "Lord, make us servants of your peace."

On October 29, we join with our Lutheran sisters and brothers in celebrating the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. Today, we rejoice that conversations between Catholic and Lutheran leaders recognize consensus on many points between their faiths ("Declaration on the Way: Church, Ministry, and Eucharist," 2015). We pray that divisions heal and celebrate the rich musical tradition with Ralph Vaughan Williams's **Lord, thou hast been our refuge** and the Chancel Ringers. (For those desiring to continue the musical celebration, consider *Reformation 500: Bach & Beyond*, a free concert

hosted at St. Mark's Lutheran Church on Fri, Nov 3, at 7:30pm.)

In the middle of October, St. John's will hear the Cathedral Choir divide into a treble chorus and a tenor-and-bass chorus for two anthems. On October 15, the tenors and basses offer the Romantic-era **Franz Schubert's setting of Psalm 23: The Lord is My Shepherd**. Similarly, on October 22 the sopranos and altos encourage all "servants of the Lord to sing praise" in **Felix Mendelssohn's Laudate pueri**. May these musical offerings remind of us God's comfort and bring us to praise God with our very life and breath.

This month, the Cathedral Kantorei begin rehearsals for Bach's sacred monument, the **B minor Mass. On Sunday, November 12** at 3pm, the Kantorei and Collegium Orchestra present this music, which gives voice to our inmost spiritual yearnings and our outward ebullient joys in the mysteries of God's love and forgiveness, the incarnation of God, and the continued working of the Holy Spirit. Transforming ourselves and our youth by seeking and serving Christ in others

A mentor and leader of a non-profit organization once told me, "many volunteers engage in ministry to serve those that are in need. Little do they know that Christ is working deeply within those volunteers to transform their hearts to come and know Christ." He was right. Charitable giving to those in need is important and holy work; however, the secret of transformation occurs in the hearts of those that serve and engage Christ in others. These words that he shared with me have continued to guide me in my work with our children and youth at the Cathedral.

One of the simplest, but most profound ways for our young people to engage in serving others is through the Lifepax ministry that

the St. John's Cathedral Youth Group has offered for many years. A Lifepax contains a variety of food within a quart-sized bag that can be easily distributed to those in need on the streets of Spokane. They are meant to be handed out when one is driving and notices a person that is hungry. Instead of handing money to that individual in need, food is offered instead.

The gift of this ministry is that we, as a community, learn to engage with people who are often ignored by hundreds of people on a daily basis. We show them the humanity that they deserve and treat them with dignity by giving them food, looking at them, and engaging them in conversation.

In the Gospel according to Matthew (25:35-36,45), Jesus clearly communicates that we must directly serve him through serving others. He states, "for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothes, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Jesus then concludes stating, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." As members of Christ's body, we are obligated to serve our brothers and sisters. When we do not serve others, we are denying Christ.

The Lifepax ministry is a source of transformation for young and old alike. It teaches our young people how to encounter Jesus in others, to love our neighbors, and be Disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world.

The need for this ministry in Spokane is expanding. More and more of our Lifepax are being handed out on a daily basis from our St. John's Cathedral family. Our youth group gave Cup of Cool

Water, a day drop-in center for homeless youth in Spokane, 50 Lifepax that they handed out in three days.

This ministry is organized by our youth group and is funded by donations. A single Lifepax costs \$2 and can be purchased at the coffee cart. Financial gifts to support this ministry are also welcome.

Estate Planning Workshop

In cooperation with the Diocese of Spokane Foundation, the Foundation for the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist is presenting an estate planning workshop in the Guild Rooms of the Cathedral on **Thursday, October 19**, 2pm-4pm.

The presenter is Ms. Stephanie Taylor of the Spokane law firm of Randall-Danskin. Ms. Taylor is a member of the Bar in the states of Florida, Washington and Idaho, earned her J.D. from Gonzaga University in 2001 and her LL.M in Taxation from the University of Florida in 2002. She is also a member of the American College of Trust and Estate Counsel as well as an Adjunct Professor of Law at Gonzaga University specializing in Estate Planning.

Ms. Taylor will provide an update on important issues impacting individual's decisions relative to their estate plans including wills, trusts, powers of attorney and health care considerations.

This presentation is one of several that are being scheduled throughout the Diocese over the coming year to help members of our congregations get the important information they need as they consider how best to handle the technical and personal issues involved with one's estate.

The workshop is *free* and is scheduled for the mid-afternoon so attendees don't have to deal with driving in the dark as the days are getting ever shorter.

From the Priest Associate

I first served as an acolyte when I was 4 years old. It was at St. John the Baptist in Ephrata and it meant so much to me that I got to be a part of the service, to dress in the robes, to be responsible for something. At St. Martin's in Moses Lake, I joined the acolyte corp when I reached 9 years of age (that was the minimum age at the time), and I'll always remember what the priest said to me that first morning: "There's an old saying I like to share with new acolytes: if every one of us does everything perfectly throughout the service, we'll all immediately be taken up to heaven...I've been doing this for over 30 years and haven't seen that happen yet!"

This saying has stuck with me because it speaks deeply to the level of attention, detail, and intentionality that should be expected of those who serve, coupled with the understanding that we all make mistakes, and it's especially easy to make one when you're 9 and serving in your first service. This is a saying that I have passed on to many acolytes throughout the years, and is a saying I will continue to pass down as I move from place to place.

Here at St. John's, we have a wonderful opportunity to raise up acolytes (whom we often refer to as servers) to perform their duties in a place and manner that asks for an intentionality and attention to detail that is not often asked of them outside of these walls. As we practice a liturgical style I like to call "West Coast High Church" (that is: Anglican High Church without all the stuffiness), we have the opportunity to train up acolytes and servers to be a crucial part of the liturgical beauty that we present each week.

This is where you come in: we need more people willing to serve as

acolytes/servers!

We are looking especially for people who are willing to be dedicated to learning this craft and helping this place put on liturgy for the larger community that lives into our High Church sensibilities with intentionality and commitment to detail. We hope that those as young as 7, or as old as 77 (or older), and anyone in between, may find a calling to serve in this place, in this role. So, if you have a child who may be interested in serving, let us know! If you remember fondly your own days as a server, and want to get involved again, let us know!

We will be holding two **training sessions** this fall, one on **Sunday October 15**, 12:30pm-3:30pm, and one on **Sunday November 12**, 12pm-3pm. The training sessions will include acolyte training, free pizza lunch, and acolyte olympics! We would hope potential servers could make both, but the expectation is that you will make **at least one** of the trainings. Following the trainings, we will produce a schedule rotation, with the goal that you will **commit to one Sunday a month**, and then be able to pick up extra roles on non-assigned Sundays as you wish. 
