87th Annual Meeting

Sunday, January 29, 2017, the 87th Annual Meeting of the Cathedral was called to order at 12:00.

Dean Ellis opened the meeting in prayer. Dean Ellis affirmed that a quorum was present.

The Rev. Nic Mather read the names of those baptized in 2016. The 2016 Necrology was read by the Dean.

The nominees for Chapter were introduced as well as those running for delegate to Diocesan Convention.

As the ballots were being counted, the Rt. Rev. James Waggoner gave the Bishop's Address, *Bread for the Journey*, which was followed by the Dean's Report.

Cathedral Treasurer Karen Martin reported that the Cathedral ended 2016 with a surplus. She then presented the 2017 budget and a motion was made to accept the budget. The motion was seconded and carried on a voice vote.

Russell Werkman, President of the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist Foundation, gave a report on the condition and work of the Foundation.

Those elected to the four 3-year terms on Chapter were Karen Byrne, Katherine Karr-Cornejo, Gretchen Ramey, and Elizabeth Rosenzweig. Pierce Hubbard was elected for a one-year term as Youth Member.

A resolution of thanks to the Right Reverend James Waggoner and Mrs. Waggoner was made, seconded, and carried on an enthusiastic voice vote.

Reel Theology continues!

Reel Theology continues through February 15, meeting every Wednesday to watch, digest, and discuss a variety of films that make us laugh, make us cry, and make us think about the deeper themes we find in our pop culture.

This year our theme is "A Slice of Life in America," and specifically we will watch films that look at issues of race and identity through a variety of lenses and experiences.

February 1: *13th* (TV-MA) is a 2016 American documentary by director Ava DuVernay. Centered on race in the United States criminal justice system, the film is titled after the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, which outlawed slavery.

February 8: *Dear White People* (R) A social satire that follows the stories of four black students at an Ivy League college where controversy breaks out over a popular but offensive black-face party thrown by white students. With tongue planted firmly in cheek, the film explores racial identity in acutely-not-post-racial America while weaving a universal story of forging one's unique path in the world.

February 15: *Zootopia* (PG) From the largest elephant to the smallest shrew, the city of Zootopia is a mammal metropolis where various animals live and thrive. When Judy Hopps becomes the first rabbit to join the police force, she quickly

From the Dean

Some years after the Civil War George Pickett was asked how the Confederates lost the battle of Gettysburg. Was it Ewell's hesitation late on the first day, Longstreet's hesitation early on the second, or Lee's overconfidence on the third? Pickett thought for a moment and then replied: "I like to think the Yankees had something to do with it." Indeed they did. I have returned to this immortal reply several times since the November election as many people have parsed and reparsed the vote in an attempt to figure out how Hillary lost. Perhaps it was her failure to take Ohio, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin seriously enough, perhaps it was the emails, perhaps it was the Russians, perhaps it was the anti-Clinton movement, perhaps it was a subtle but deeply entrenched sexism. Just as the various reasons for the rebel loss at Gettysburg may well have played a part, so too are the factors many have cited just possibly part of the reason for Hillary's defeat. But, when it gets right down to it, I like to think Donald Trump had something to do with it.

Trump did not invent the discontent that has afflicted much of the United States over the past several years, a discontent caused in part by globalism and pluralism, in part by the threat of terrorism, in part by wars that seem to have no end. He was the candidate who, through his startling populist assertions and denials, some of which were self-contradictory, managed to reflect and harness that discontent better than any other candidate. That has a lot to do with why he won. Having harnessed that sense of discontent and division, President Trump is now charged with the responsibility of overcoming it,

and uniting this great nation once again around a common purpose.

I truly believe he wants to do just that; he wants to reunite this country, but he is not going to be able to do it by identifying scapegoats, whether these scapegoats be Muslims from other countries or Mexicans, or multi-national corporations. On the contrary, blaming NAFTA and the TPP, or undocumented immigrants, or foreign nationals, is going to further divide the country and make it harder, not easier to govern. Decrying Obama's tendency to rule by "executive order" and then spending his first week in office doing exactly that, without even consulting Congress—both chambers of which are Republican—stirs up feelings of uncertainty and suspicion on both side of the aisle. Even those who most want him to succeed, who support him most heartily, must be noticing this.

If President Trump is to succeed there is a path open to him, but it is a different path than he took to his election. It is the path we heard described in the passage from Micah last Sunday: "Do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God." People will not agree completely on what those three things look like, but when it becomes clear to the people of this nation that those entrusted with our governance are truly trying to do that then it will be possible to imagine moving together once again. Donald Trump got elected by resonating remarkably well with distress and division; my fervent prayer is that he will govern by resonating equally well with hope, compassion and unity.

Music at the Cathedral

The liturgical readings in February continue to highlight aspects of discipleship but they shift from the initial call to highlight in a special way the pursuit of justice, living the way of light and truth, and Jesus' call to love enemies. The anthems and hymnody echo these themes but do not provide answers; rather, they call us to ask how we each are to do this. I'm reminded of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s letter from jail on loving thy enemies. He states, "First, we must develop and maintain the capacity to forgive.... Second, we must recognize that the evil deed of the enemy-neighbor, the thing that hurts, never quite expresses all that he is.... Third, we must not seek to defeat or humiliate the enemy but to win his friendship and understanding." May our community's song help in asking ourselves how we can best love.

On **February 5**, the Cathedral Choir shares "Blessed are they that fear him" by German Romantic composer Felix Mendelssohn, singing in hope, "Through darkness riseth light to shine on the upright, for the merciful, the compassionate, and the righteous." The Junior Choir joins us this day in singing, "Arise, shine, your light has come."

The Cathedral Ringers play "Peace," a reflective meditation, and the American folk tune "Holy Manna" on **February 12**. The Cathedral Choir sings Sergei Rachmaninoff's Блаженъ мужъ (Blessed is the man), from his *All-Night Vigil*, composed for the Russian Orthodox Church in 1915. A quintet will also sing Francis Poulenc's, "Seigneur, je vous en prie," a short French setting in a style one might call "sacred barbershop," which expresses the tender yet ardent text, "let the burning and gentle force of

Thy love pervade my soul."

We seek wisdom on **February 19** by singing William Byrd's "Teach me, O Lord," a verse-anthem of the English Renaissance, alternating soloist with full choir with verses from Psalm 119 that express a longing for understanding and right living. The choir also sings Maurice Durufle's "Ubi caritas," featuring the Latin plainchant of the text, "Where love is found, God is there."

We celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration on **February 26** with J.S. Bach's motet "O Jesus Christ, my life's light" and Morten Lauridsen's "O nata lux." A recipient of the National Medal of Arts, Lauridsen is recognized as one of the foremost choral composers in the United States, but we can consider him "local," originally hailing from Colfax, Washington.

Mark your calendars for upcoming sacred music liturgies and events. The Choral Scholars will present Lenten Choral Evensong on March 24, which will be a reflective pause during the season of Lent. On Good Friday, April 14, we offer our Seven Last Words through music of our African American tradition in a lunch-hour service, highlighting the beauty and moving music of spirituals. On Good Friday evening, we offer a spiritual concert with the Baroque

masterwork by Dieterich Buxtehude, *Membra Jesu nostri*, which is a cycle of cantatas each dedicated to part of Christ's body—"to the knees, to the heart, to the hands...." Join us for this spiritual concert with dance and members of our Collegium and Kantorei Choir.

Greetings and Peace from Kathmandu!

Stephen Novak Foundation News

We have been very busy since arriving in Kathmandu on January 11. “We” being myself, Nancy Spada, board member and Fair Trade importer, and Kirk Richmond, board member. I had wired almost \$10,000 to Tula Shakya, our Foundation partner in Nepal, prior to our arrival. Our first priority was our school, Shree Mahankal Primary School which we have been working with since 1998.

The earthquakes of 2015 devastated many parts of Nepal. Our school was in a geographically bad location. A few years before the earthquakes we helped the village to buy land in a better location and rebuilt the school to earthquake resistant standards. As a result, it remained standing and was a shelter for many people who could reach it. The second quake caused some serious cracks in the walls which have since been repaired with Foundation funds. The old school was covered in a landslide, was dug out by villagers and is functioning as a meeting space and a monthly medical clinic.

Since I have not been back to Nepal since 2008, I had not seen the new school. What a difference! The campus has five buildings and serves K-5 grades. The students learned a Nepali Welcome Song and Dance for us. One of the 5 teachers has some musical skills and sang and played the drum while the kids performed. There is some obvious talent here and we discussed getting several drums, small cymbals and tambourines for the teacher to do more with music and dance. Such outlets are very important for children who have been severely traumatized by the earthquakes. Also on their teacher staff is a young man educated in physical education, another great outlet for trauma.

St. Agnes Window Dedication

In the bathroom off the narthex, formerly called the Bride’s Room, The Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist has a new stained glass window—St. Agnes of Rome.

The window will be dedicated at the conclusion of the 10:30am Eucharist on **Sunday, March 5**.

The window is given in memory of Richard L. Vlaminck, by his uncle William Laurie.

The window was designed and fabricated by Greg Gorman of Lyme Center, NH. Greg has over a generation of experience restoring, designing, painting, and fabricating ecclesiastical stained glass. In the early 1980s he studied the art of glass painting at the Connick Associates’ Studios in Boston, MA. St. John’s Cathedral has 38 Connick windows and St. Agnes is the first Connick-styled window to be installed in 37 years. The introduction of Greg’s craft to St. John’s intends to realize Cathedral Architect Hal Whitehouse’s original vision where he wrote, “The windows will exhibit the best attainment in the art of stained-glass, being the work of Chas. J. Connick, of Boston...” Hopefully, St. John’s Cathedral will be seeing more of Greg’s careful and lovingly meticulous work in the future.

Here’s some information to help you “read” the St. Agnes window. She is the patron saint of engaged couples, girls, virgins, rape survivors, chastity, and gardeners. She was identified as a devoted Christian by the Roman Republic and martyred in her early teens in the early 4th Century for allegedly refusing to marry a nobleman. Agnes is holding a lamb and a martyr’s palm as symbols of a sacrificial follower of Christ. She is barefoot and dressed in a robe to symbolize her devotion to Christ and her inno-
