88th Annual Meeting

Sunday, January 28, 2018, the 88th Annual Meeting of the Cathedral was called to order at 12:10pm.

Bishop Rehberg opened the meeting in prayer.

Jason Brown certified that a quorum was present.

The Rev. Nic Mather read the names of those baptized in 2017. The 2017 Necrology was read by Canon Kristi Philip.

The nominees for Chapter were introduced as well as those running for delegate to Diocesan Convention.

As the ballots were being counted, the Right Reverend Gretchen Rehberg gave the Bishop's Address, which was followed by the Interim Vicar's Report.

Cathedral Treasurer Karen Martin reported that the Cathedral ended 2017 with a surplus. She then presented the 2018 budget and a motion was made to accept the budget. The motion was seconded and carried on a voice vote.

Though not on the agenda, Russell Werkman, for the Foundation, gave a report following the Cathedral Treasurer's report.

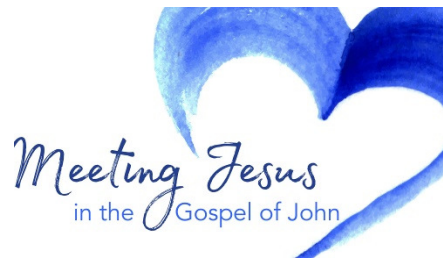
The entire slate of Chapter candidates was elected by unanimous consent: Justin Haldeman, Kathie Hawkins, Jim Holmes, Patti Stice, John Wallingford. The Youth Representative – Isabella McDonnell – was elected by unanimous consent to a one-year term.

Two Lenten Opportunities to Explore

Lent will bring two new opportunities to explore the faith journey, one on Sunday mornings and one on Wednesday evenings.



Sunday Mornings

On Sundays the theme will be *Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John*, and will meet 9:15am-10:15am, a time tucked conveniently between the 8am and 10:30am services.

The material for this series is a small book, furnished to participants without cost, that was created by the Society of St. John the Evangelist and the Ministry of Teaching at Virginia Theological Seminary.

The beauty of this is that it is a rather simple daily exercise of reading and reflecting on a single verse of the gospel and then jotting notes and thoughts in the book, which is also a journal. There are also daily videos available online: meetingjesusinjohn.org

Wednesday Evenings

The Wednesday series is based on the theme *Everyday Holiness*, and will look at simple spiritual practice in the midst of everyday life.

These Wednesday evening gatherings offer a celebration of the Eucharist in the Cathedral at 5:30pm, followed by a soup supper in the Great Hall at 6:15pm. The program begins at 7pm.

From the Interim Vicar

I had one of those memorable coffee hour conversations one Sunday when I was serving as a supply priest in the diocese when a woman commented that she always looked forward to Lent because it was such a sad time.

I hope she meant that Lent is for her a solemn time – certainly a time to pray and ponder, but maybe not a time to focus on sadness. I like to think about Lent as an opportunity to engage in some intentional spiritual practice. From year to year, that spiritual practice has looked very different for me.

Certainly, having this ‘forty days and forty nights’ set aside can be a gift and a time to focus. The early Church, we are reminded in the Ash Wednesday liturgy, saw Lent as a time for converts to prepare for baptism and for ‘notorious sinners’ to be restored, after penitence and reconciliation, to the fellowship of the Church at Easter. Our definition of lent is probably broader, but still includes opportunities for penitence and for deeper formation in the faith.

We begin on Ash Wednesday with the acknowledgement of our humanness. We are not perfect. We will not live forever. But we are always loved and forgiven by God. The remainder of Lent we are reminded of the solemnity of the time by the words, music and environment of our worship. Alleluias are gone for a while. Our music tends to be more solemn and reflective. Purple is the color of the season.

Sometimes we fast. We might fast from some foods, from alcohol, or some other thing that is non-essential. But there are other ways to fast. As a former journalist with a serious news addition, I

have sometimes limited my consumption of news during Lent. As a bit of a workaholic, I have sometimes carved out more time to do nothing – to sit still, be quiet, create space for God.

In my experience, fasting is both a discipline and a practice that opens the door toward a deeper spirituality. Abstaining from food, for example, may remind us of those who do not have enough to eat and focus us on prayer and action in response. Turning off the TV gives us the gift of silence and the opportunity for reflection or some helpful reading.

Sometimes Lent is for us the time to increase our time for worship and prayer. Some choose to join in the Wednesday 10am or 5:30pm celebrations of the Eucharist here at the Cathedral. This year we will also provide a daily reflection from the Gospel of John in a lovely journal and a Sunday opportunity to join with others who choose this practice. Carving out some additional prayer time at home or at church is always an option.

Our Wednesday evening Lenten programs (7pm Wednesdays) will focus on “Everyday Holiness,” and look at some simple spiritual practices that are part of our every-day lives. There is more information about both our Wednesday and our Sunday Lenten series in this issue of the *Chimes*.

Whatever way you choose to observe Lent this year is a choice rich with opportunity – an opportunity to deepen our relationship with God and one another and to prepare for the joyous celebration of Easter that lies ahead. May you have a blessed Lent.

The memorial service for Polly McMahon will be 7pm on **Sunday, February 11**, with a reception following the service.

Music at the Cathedral

February marks the liturgical shift from the Season after Epiphany to Lent with Ash Wednesday on February 14. The Junior Choir will sing at Sunday liturgy on February 4, paired with the Cathedral Choir's offering of a Psalm of praise by Norwegian composer Knut Nystedt (1915-2014), Laudate. February 11 marks the last Sunday in this Season and the Feast of the Transfiguration, for which the choir sings English Renaissance composer Thomas Tallis's *O nata lux*. The text "O nata lux de lumine" is sung at Lauds (morning praise in the daily office of prayer) for the Feast of the Transfiguration. Its mystical text "O light born of light" follows with a prayer for us all—like Peter, James, and John on the high mountain—to be members of Christ's body.

St. John's Music Series presents **Spokane Mid-Winter** on **Saturday, Feb 24**, at 7:30pm. Featuring the Cathedral Kantorei Choir, this concert celebrates the choral voice of Spokane composers. The concert opens with a joyful "Gloria" from *Missa Pacem* by **Marc Hafsø**, Director of Choral Activities at Whitworth University. The Kantorei sing three musical premieres: *There is no rose* by **Cary Boyce**, executive director of Spokane Public Radio; *Snowflakes* by **Dawn Sonntag**, composition and theory professor at Gonzaga University; *Psalm 146* by **Brent Edstrom**, jazz pianist at Whitworth University.

The centerpiece of the concert is **Morten Lauridsen's** *Mid-Winter Songs*, with texts by Robert Graves. Born in Colfax in 1943, Lauridsen is a nationally recognized composer, designated an "American Choral Master" by the National Endowment for the

Arts. The concert closes with Tri-Cities composer **Reginald Unterseher's** *Pilgrim Spring*, with a poignant, hopeful text by the composer and his wife, Sheila Dunlop. All are invited to sing this final text to the *Southern Harmony* tune, BEACH SPRING.

We are especially pleased to welcome pianist **Mary J. Trotter** back to Spokane for this performance, known for her spirited interpretation of text and music. Tickets (\$5 students, \$10 general) are available at

As the stream flows to the river,
as the spark turns into fire
We grow stronger in our journey
to the land of heart's desire,

And the ones who live in darkness
shall be children of the light.

Serving Christ

As we immerse ourselves in Lent, our children and youth ministry programming shifts focus. Normally during this season, we are called to give something up as a reflection of our penitence to Christ and remembering Jesus' 40 days of fasting in the desert. I would like to encourage an alternative way of observing Lent, taking on a new practice to enrich your faith. Our children and youth ministries will be taking on new observances by serving Christ in others through action and live into our identity as members of the Jesus movement.

Each Sunday morning, children and youth are invited to join us for pretzel making at 9am. I'm currently looking for volunteers to assist with the program since I will be busy at the 9am Family Service. Making pretzels is a great fellowship activity and way for us to raise money for donation to Episcopal Migration Ministries – an organization that works with “affiliate partners to provide refugees with the information and services they require to thrive in their new communities.”

During Lent, St. John's Youth Group will focus on being a follower of Jesus and serving Christ through others. One of the ways in which we will serve will include an evening when we will go to Cup of Cool Water to learn about the organization and assist at the facility. This organization focuses on “walk[ing] alongside youth who are homeless. Through the Gospel of Jesus Christ, [they] build healthy relationships, provide services, and disciple street youth. [Cup] provide[s] a safe, peaceful space where youth can experience a respite from street culture.” Volunteering at this organization is one of the many ways in which we can give back

to our greater Spokane community.

Also during Lent, we will gather at West Central Episcopal Mission (which serves those in need in the West Central neighborhood) to serve. We will be guided in cleaning the facilities and serving the organization in any way they need assistance. This may occur on a Sunday instead of a Wednesday evening.

Young Eagles will also have the opportunity to serve at the Cathedral and potentially at other organizations such as West Central Episcopal Mission. Instilling service learning in our youngest members prepares them for a life of thoughtful inquiry and encountering God in hands-on ministry.

The Promise, A Lenten family service of joyful noise, will begin at 9am in All Saint's Chapel on Sundays beginning February 18. This is a unique, welcoming Eucharist with energetic participation and an interactive liturgy especially suited for families with small children. This service lasts half an hour.

Our youngest members will be busy with serving our St. John's Cathedral family and Spokane! Matthew 25:35-36 says, “for I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.” We will be living into our identity as members of the Jesus Movement and as Christians. We will strive to look for Christ and serve him in others.

From the Priest Associate

The Reel Theology series has been a unique one this year (at least in terms of the three times I've helped lead the series), in that all of our movies are based on true stories and all of our movies are quite explicitly religious. Often we use the Reel Theology series to find God present in more secular films, films from our shared pop culture experience or those indie darlings that always seem to pack quite the punch. In past years, we have watched documentaries dealing with very real world circumstances across the globe, and have discussed how we may raise awareness for those issues and fight injustice in this world. But this year, we have watched movies that are about the Church, and it has been interesting to watch how these films unfold and inform our understanding of what the church in the

world might look like.

One thing from these films that has stood out to me is the resilience shown by the local expression of church in each film, even as the rest of the world has moved on. From resurrecting a dying parish, refusing to abandon one's flock in the face of near-certain death (x2), to being the literal mouthpiece of God in the face of the most powerful ruler of your people, resilience and perseverance are key to each expression of church found in each of these films. And, this challenges us to look inward and honestly reflect if we practice this same resilience and perseverance in the expression of faith that we put out to the world.

Are we willing to stand against the world and persevere in an expression of justice that runs counter-cultural to the ways of this world, this country, this community? Are we willing to give voice to the voiceless? Are we willing to see our own privilege and recognize

that much of what we have is by virtue of our birth or the luck of the draw in our parents or the ability to have an education with few barriers placed in our way to achieving success?

In watching the films in this Reel Theology series, it has become clear to me that we have to answer yes to these questions (and many more that will challenge us) if we are to truly be the expression of the church in the world that we so desperately want it to be. We can be inspired by the examples we have seen in each of these films (again, all of which are based on true stories), and draw strength from knowing that the church has a history of quiet leaders chosen to lead with strength, resilience, and perseverance.

If you missed any of our films this year, they were: All Saints (2017), Of Gods and Men (2010), The Mission (1986), and The Prince of Egypt (1998).

From the Senior Warden

Peter and Paul had very different ideas on what practices should be followed in the early church. Peter thought conformance to Jewish law was still expected, Paul thought the bonds of the law were superseded by love. Of course they were both right. The law is to serve us, it is a tool. It is not the end unto itself. Laws are not perfect and new circumstances sometimes require us to explore the intent of the law and revise the words of the law. That is a great calling of the church, to seek social justice through fair and just institutions. In the church we make rules, too, to govern our behavior. In making the rules we discuss what is fair and right and important. Rule making in the Church is a tool to help us understand how to love in our time. Indeed, all of what we do in church, from worship to outreach, to prepar-

ing food for the membership are behaviors that we use to train our hearts, and each of these activities is governed by its own set of rules.

Being asked by the Bishop to take the post of Senior Warden is an awesome moment. There are so many ways to mess up, it's hard to thread the needle of right behavior in this complex place without accidentally violating the rules. But I know that everyone of us at the Cathedral is trying to do what we think is right for ourselves and our neighbors. The Bishop, too. So, I accepted the appointment knowing full well that I'd make mistakes. I'll have to rely on your forgiveness when that happens. I would like your guidance to avoid forced errors.

Being asked to serve in Cathedral leadership is also a terrific opportunity. Our Cathedral is more than a beautiful building on a hill, it is the place where this congregation wrestles as properly as we can with the meaning of love and faith and justice. The way we live at the

Cathedral is a signal to Spokane of the way we would like the whole city to live, the whole world, the Kingdom of God. On accepting this post my first study was the bylaws of the Cathedral. I've found some inconsistencies and ambiguities in that document and have asked for help to clarify those passages. It will take some time and many eyes (ie, the Chapter) to be sure our rules are clear and make sense. We will draw on our Episcopal tradition of deliberation with dignity and respect, and God willing, with grace. God bless us with grace.

I intend to write from time to time about my experience as Senior Warden and about the thinking of Chapter. Chapter has much to consider this year to address the priorities in our Profile: welcoming, support of youth, outreach and education, our civic community and more. Please share your concerns and hopes with any Chapter member; we will reserve time to address your comments at Chapter meetings, for the good of the order.

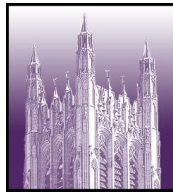
