Lenten Opportunities Continue

Lent 2018 has two opportunities to explore the faith journey, one on Sunday mornings and one on Wednesday evenings.




Sunday Mornings

On Sundays the theme is *Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John*, meeting 9:15am-10:15am, a time tucked conveniently between the 8am and 10:30am services.

The material for this series is a small book, furnished to participants without cost, that was created by the Society of St. John the Evangelist and the Ministry of Teaching at Virginia Theological Seminary.

This is a rather simple daily exercise of reading and reflecting on a single verse of the gospel and then jotting notes and thoughts in the book, which is also a journal. There are also daily videos available online: meetingjesusinjohn.org Many throughout the Diocese and in the wider Episcopal Church are sharing in this as well.

On Sundays, there will be an opportunity for all who are participating to gather for additional conversation. It is also possible to use this simple journaling exercise without the Sunday group, but it would be a much richer experience with the conversation with others.



Wednesday Evenings

The Wednesday series is based on the theme *Everyday Holiness*, and looks at simple spiritual practice in the midst of everyday life.

These Wednesday evening gatherings offer a celebration of the Eucharist in the Cathedral at 5:30pm, followed by a soup supper in the Great Hall at 6:15pm. The program begins at 7pm.

Here are the remaining dates and topics:

- **March 7: Savoring God: God in the Midst of the Ordinary** / Kathy Finley, Teacher, Author and Spiritual Director
- **March 14: The Rhythm of Prayer** / The Rt. Rev. Gretchen Rehberg, Bishop of Spokane
- **March 21: The Practice of Sabbath** / Rabbi Elizabeth Goldstein, Associate Professor of Religious Studies, Gonzaga University; and Rabbi to the Jewish Community of the Palouse

From the Interim Vicar

During the discernment process before electing a new diocesan bishop we prayed a prayer for the diocese that included the petition, "Make us grateful for our past and eager for our future."

I thought about that prayer a few weeks ago as we installed the officers of the Church Service League, an organization with both a rich history and a promising future.

The Service League was founded in the 1920s as "a clearing house for church activities," according to a history of the role of women at the Cathedral written in 1979, the Cathedral's fiftieth anniversary. Browsing through that history, I discovered lists of wide-ranging work that included much fund-raising, coordination of a number of guilds and other groups such as church school teachers, as well as a list of mission priorities across the diocese and the world.

Of course, the Service League has always been predominantly a women's organization. In its earlier days there were few opportunities for women who were interested in leadership in the church and groups like the Service League and guilds offered ways women could be effective and creative leaders.

In Episcopal churches women could not serve on vestries, be elected to serve at diocesan conventions, serve as a lay reader or be an acolyte until the late 1960s. (The Cathedral Chapter had a woman member in the mid-1950s, but it is not clear whether she was a voting member.) This was simply how the church was. Women could help raise money but could not vote in the parish or diocesan-

wide decisions on how to spend it.

In 1967 women were given the right to serve as General Convention deputies and also were approved to be ordained to the diaconate. The General Convention approved the ordination of women to the priesthood in 1976.

These changes opened doors to new ways to serve, but women's organizations also found vigor in a new environment that offered women considerably more choices and responsibilities.

I thought of all of that history as we installed this year's group of Service League officers. Times have changed greatly. We have fewer guilds because the patterns of women's lives and priorities have changed, but the Service League still has a variety of responsibilities.


Some of those are well known. The annual Christmas Faire continues to draw shoppers and raises money for projects. The Windfall, a thrift shop in the Perry District, continues to hum with activity as well as a ministry to the neighborhood. The Service League also continues to coordinate Sunday coffee hours and serves as an umbrella organization for the guilds.

And they have been busy and generous with recent projects – things like refurbishing the Guild Rooms with new carpeting, contributing to diocesan efforts like pontoons for the boat that ferries campers to camp. They've provided camperships for children in the Perry Neighborhood, provided help for numerous Cathedral refurbishment efforts and reached out with contributions to a variety of community agencies.

There is plenty of ministry to be done, and they are moving ahead with it. And we are grateful – just as we are grateful for our past and eager for our future.

Music at the Cathedral

March continues our Lenten journey, ending with Holy Week and Easter on April 1. The anthems offered point with increasing intensity to Passion Sunday and Good Friday, paralleling the Lectionary scriptures.

On Lent 3 (March 4) we recall Jesus throwing out the money changers in the temple. For this Sunday, the Cathedral Choir sings French composer Francis Poulenc's (1899-1963) *Timor et Tremor*, from his set of four penitential motets. The text expresses the darkness we experience (Fear and trembling have come upon me, and darkness has fallen upon me) and connects it with a prayer of trust: "Hear my prayer, because thou art my refuge and my strong helper." At communion, the choir sings Vaughan Williams' "O how amiable," echoing the Gospel with the text, "My soul hath a desire and longing to enter in to the courts of the Lord."

On Lent 4 (March 11) both the Junior Choir and Chancel Ringers join us for liturgy. The adult choir has a reprieve this Sunday, preparing for the upcoming Holy Week.

On Lent 5 (March 18) the Cathedral Choir sings Gregorio Allegri's famed setting of Psalm 51, *Miserere*, composed during the Renaissance for use at the Sistine Chapel. Its extreme, high range music, sung by a quartet located in the west balcony, expresses the yearning for mercy. William Walton's *A Litany* serves as the communion anthem, with its haunting text, "Drop, drop slow tears" and wandering harmonies.

On Passion/Palm Sunday (March 25) we gather in the Great Hall for the Liturgy of the Palms.

This liturgy is one of contrast: we begin by waving palms and singing "Hosanna" in praise of Jesus, but mid-service the liturgy shifts to the Passion. Our music mirrors this split: our liturgy opens with the bright choral introit *Hosianna dem Sohne Davids* (Hosanna to the Son of David) by Gesius, followed by a festive setting of All Glory, Laud and Honor with our Chancel Ringers. The tone of our prayer shifts with the spiritual "Calvary" and Eric William Barnum's haunting setting of Mohawk poetry in "The Brier."

Our liturgical celebrations on **Good Friday, March 30**, aim to invite greater broader participation through a different schedule. The traditional Good Friday liturgy is at 3pm, with the Cathedral Choir leading music. At 7pm, the Rev. Canon Kristi Philip, the Cathedral Kantorei Choir, and Collegium Orchestra lead "Bittersweet Bach: A Good Friday Musical Expression." Alternating reflections of poetry and prayer with three cantatas by Bach, this service includes participatory hymnody and prayer. It is aimed for our congregation and the broader Spokane community.

Easter Sunday (April 1) shines with the resplendence of the Cathedral Brass and Chancel Ringers at both morning services, and we invite all to sing with us Handel's "Hallelujah" chorus from *Messiah* at the 10:30am service, full of the resurrection joy in new life!



Serving Christ

Our Lenten observances continue throughout this season of penitence and redemption. Children and youth ministries are spending significant time serving others in our surrounding community. On Sundays, we are focusing our energy serving our Cathedral family through the intergenerational pretzel-making practice and donating the proceeds to Episcopal Migration Ministries.

Young Eagles, our middle-school and elementary youth group, will be engaging in ministry, learning about serving Christ through others. Last Sunday, February 25, Young Eagles went to Cup of Cool Water to assist in cleaning their facilities and learning about the unique ministry that they provide to homeless youth in the surrounding Spokane area.

Cup of Cool Water is an “organization in downtown Spokane that walks alongside youth who are homeless. Through the gospel of Jesus Christ, [they] build healthy relationships, provide services, and disciples street youth.” On **Saturday, March 24**, Young Eagles will gather in the morning (time to be determined) to eat breakfast with those in the West Central neighborhood and learn about the mission and ministry of the organization. After breakfast, we will serve West Central Episcopal Mission and debrief our experience.

St. John's Youth Group, our high school group, will serve at Cup of Cool Water on **Wednesday, February 28**, to learn about the wonderful mission and ministry of supporting the homeless youth in the surrounding community. Our youth group has spent hours putting together Lifepax, blankets and making pretzels that will be delivered to Cup of Cool Water. We will gather for dinner with the employees and discuss

the experience of homelessness in Spokane. After dinner, we will get a detailed tour of the facility and be put to work! On **Wednesday, March 7**, Youth Group will go to West Central Episcopal Mission to serve at their Dinner Table. This is a wonderful opportunity to witness Christ through others as we serve some of the most vulnerable in the West Central neighborhood.

As we approach Holy Week, there are two new services that will be offered for our families at the Cathedral. On **Wednesday, March 28** at 7 pm, Youth Group and many others in our community will be organizing and participating in a spiritual Tenebrae worship service. This will be an immersive spiritual experience that pulls us into deep meditative prayer while we venerate the Cross, sing Taizé music and sit in silence.

At noon on **Good Friday, March 30**, children, youth, and their families are invited to join me and members of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church as we walk the Stations of the Cross in downtown Spokane. We will meet at the Rotary Fountain at Riverfront Park and the event will end under the freeway at Fourth and Howard. This urban experience has 14 different stations that recognize social service agencies and ministries that help the homeless, oppressed, sick and downtrodden. While bringing awareness to the issues that surround our community, we walk with Christ and immerse ourselves in this holy experience. Typically, after walking the stations, I have invited parents and youth to join me at the Riverfront mall to eat food and spend time together in fellowship.

Holy Week 2018

Each year we offer a variety of opportunities for worship and reflection during Holy Week. This year, the schedule is a little different from recent years, and offers some new opportunities.

Holy Wednesday, March 28 Tenebrae Service • 7pm

Tenebrae is an ancient religious service of Western Christianity, traditionally consisting of matins and lauds of the last three days of Holy Week (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday) celebrated on the evening of the previous day to the accompaniment of the gradual extinguishing of candles.

Join us this Holy Week for our own expression of Tenebrae where we will hear the story of Jesus' passion and spend time as a community in prayer. This service will be in the Cathedral at 7pm on Wednesday, March 28.

Maundy Thursday, March 29 Meal & Worship • 6pm

Join us on Maundy Thursday, March 29 at 6pm, beginning in the Great Hall. The stories of Maundy Thursday are centered around a gospel lesson of service and the institution of Holy Communion, combined with our preparations for watching and waiting with Christ before his betrayal and death. This year we will worship together in holy community as we break bread together by sharing dinner with one another, participating in the humble act of foot washing (optional), and working together to strip the altar in the Cathedral as we prepare for Good Friday.

Good Friday, March 30 Stations of the Cross • noon

Children, youth, and their families are invited to join members of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church as we walk the Stations of the Cross in downtown Spokane. We will

meet at the Rotary Fountain at Riverfront Park and the event will end under the freeway at Fourth and Howard. This urban experience has 14 different stations that recognize social service agencies and ministries that help the homeless, oppressed, sick and downtrodden. While bringing awareness to the issues that surround our community, we walk with Christ and immerse ourselves in this holy experience.

Good Friday, March 30 Liturgy • 3pm

One of the ways Good Friday will be observed this year at St. John's will be offering the Good Friday liturgy at 3pm in the Cathedral.

This is a traditional service found in the *Book of Common Prayer* on page 276 and offered at most Episcopal churches. There are special prayers, scripture readings, a brief sermon, and hymns in this liturgy, as well as an opportunity to honor the cross for those who wish.

Good Friday, March 30 Music, Prayer, Poetry • 7pm

The Rev. Canon Kristi Philip, the Cathedral Kantorei Choir, and Collegium Orchestra lead "Bittersweet Bach: A Good Friday Musical Expression."

Alternating reflections of poetry and prayer with three cantatas by Bach, this service includes participatory hymnody and prayer. It is aimed for our congregation and the broader Spokane community.

Holy Saturday, March 31 The Great Vigil of Easter • 7pm

We move—literally, spiritually, and emotionally—from the darkness of Good Friday to the bright joy of resurrection in this service filled with Scripture, music, baptisms, and Eucharist. Bishop Gretchen Rehberg will preach and celebrate.

This year all of the proceeds from the sale of pretzels will be donated to Episcopal Migration Ministries—an organization that works with "affiliate partners to provide refugees with the information and services they require to thrive in their new communities." We can make a difference!

Please consider helping make the pretzels or you can enjoy eating them as they are sold in the Great Hall after the 10:30am service. Pretzels are 50¢ each or \$1.25 for 3.

From the Priest Associate

We're two weeks into Lent, how are you doing?

It takes at least 21 days by conventional wisdom and likely more like 66 days to change our habits, to change those things that are second nature. This is why Lent is so good and so challenging. If you make a concerted effort to create real change in your life, it will take at least half of Lent before you start to notice real change, and it likely takes longer than the entirety of Lent for it to become a permanent life change.

This is why the two-week mark is so important. The first two weeks of creating real change in our lives are some of the hardest personal work we will do. And with an end date that feels so far away, but also serves as an easy out, it makes sense that we begin to slip and cheat a little here and there, especially as we move from week two

to week three.

Don't give up!

This is the critical week if you want to create real change in your life. Whether you are giving up or taking up, it is the decisions, priorities, and commitments you make right now that will determine the lasting impact your Lenten disciplines will have on the rest of your life. Know that God is with you in this time, guiding you, strengthening you, and providing the opportunities for you to draw closer to God through the disciplines you do in Lent and throughout the whole year.

Joy in Lent

Too often we get really caught up in the solemnity of Lent and forget that we are allowed to continue experiencing joy throughout this season. I have had experiences of joy in meeting with dedicated youth and leaders from across the diocese last weekend to discuss the vision and future of youth ministry for this place at this time and setting us up to continue well into the future. I had the experience of joy in joining

with other people from our region to learn from Dent Davidson as he presented a workshop on how vital song leads to expressions of vital church. I am hopeful that I get to experience joy this next week as we head down to Las Vegas to watch Gonzaga take on the West Coast Conference's best in their annual season-end tournament.

Where is the joy you are experiencing this season of Lent? Perhaps you have joy when you remember that pretzels are once again available! Perhaps you have seen the joy in the faces of children experiencing our Lenten family service at 9am. Perhaps you have joy as you meet Jesus in the gospel of John. Perhaps you have joy each Wednesday, worshipping, eating, and growing in community. Wherever it may be, look for that joy that still abounds in this season as you also consider how these experiences inform the solemn understanding of this season. Prayers for a solemn *and* joyful, blessed Lent.

From the Senior Warden

The Chapter met in retreat on February 10 to set some goals for the year's work and followed that retreat with our February business meeting. Here are some observations I found notable. About half of the Chapter members are not native to Spokane, and many came to the Episcopal church in adulthood. Like most churches, we are interested in attracting young families, but this suggests there is another pool of persons we need to actively welcome.

There is broad support in Chapter to engage the community, to put in place more systematic welcoming, and to increase our efforts to communicate to the congregation what is going on and what opportunities are before us. Some particulars identified for further work: a welcoming brochure for visitors, an

electronic marquee, and encouragement for Chapter and the congregation to identify newcomers by name. Chapter members Patti Stice and Jim Holmes were designated to both liaise with and contribute to the efforts of the Communications Committee.

Colin Haffner reported on research by the Education and Youth Committee (Formation) on an electronic marquee in the welcome center. Seeing great potential, Chapter encouraged the Committee to continue its efforts, including rules for determining information content, day to day management, security and cost of the system. Note that four Chapter members are directly involved in Formation: Colin, Katherine Karr-Cornejo, Elizabeth Rosenzweig and youth representative Isabella McDonald.

Two other areas of importance were the reconstitution of an Outreach Committee and the establishment of a Welcome Committee.

For Outreach, Chapter members Gretchen Ramey and Mike Lieserson agreed to work with the Committee once it is formed; I have been in discussion with previous leaders of outreach to identify potential committee members and will continue toward that goal with Interim Vicar Kristi Phillip. I asked Katherine Karr-Cornejo to help me establish a Welcome Committee and to work with Communications to develop a welcome brochure.

Other liaison assignments taken on for the year are Karen Byrne with Stewardship, Jason Brown for Property, Justin Haldeman for Finance, Kathie Hawkins for Lay Ministries (being re-formed by Kristi). Note that every Chapter member is linked to the work of one or more committees and that we have committed double coverage in high priority areas. My thanks to the members for taking on the work for the good of the order.


