From the Interim Vicar

You might have noticed a small change in the prayer we have been praying each Sunday as we prepare to call a new dean for this cathedral. Now we pray especially for our Chapter, our elected leadership group, rather than the Dean Call Committee. This is because the Dean Call Committee (DCC) has completed its work and handed the next phase of the process on to the Chapter.

But even though these two hard-working groups have had special leadership roles, this process also belongs to all of us. It is a process of discernment – a way of prayerfully and faithfully sorting out who God is calling to be our dean.

“Journey” would be a good word for the last year or so.

It began with multiple opportunities for us to weigh in on what we think is important as we seek a new Dean. First, there was a fairly brief survey. Later, there was a more lengthy survey – the Congregation Assessment Tool (CAT) that identified some of the things that are important to us, ways the parish community functions, and what drives our satisfaction. After those were completed, there was an opportunity to weigh in in person at a symposium that covered several topics of importance, including worship, youth ministry, adult formation and other areas of parish life.

All of that information was studied, sorted out and combined with history and other data that described both the nature of the cathedral and what gifts and skills we desire in a Dean and became our parish profile. In addition, the DCC also completed a parish portfolio that was posted on the national database for the Episco-

pal Church’s Office of Transition Ministry.

Both of those documents became available to as resources to those discerning if they might be called to the ministry of Dean here. Both give some information to those who wonder if their gifts and skills line up well with the person we are seeking.

The next phase was identifying candidates. In that part of the process, Bishop Gretchen Rehberg and Diocesan Transition Minister Susan Cleveley did the initial screening of applicants and passed a list of qualified candidates to the DCC. The DCC reviewed the material, conducted reference checks and interviews and narrowed the field to the ones they considered best qualified.

And now this list of candidates is in the hands of the Chapter. Over the coming weeks they will contact the candidates, spend some time with them via Skype and invite each for a visit that will include interviews, opportunities to explore Spokane and acquaint them with the Cathedral and the Diocese.

This visit does not include any interaction with the congregation as a whole. This is quite standard in such processes. Their time will largely be spent with Chapter, staff, Bishop and Transition Minister.

When all the candidates have visited, the Chapter will prayerfully choose the person to be invited to become the Dean.

But we all still have a role. That role is continuing prayerful support. Remember, it is the Holy Spirit who is really in charge of this process. Please remember the Chapter, the candidates and all who have worked along the way in your prayers in the coming weeks. And please give thanks for the ministry of the Rev. Barbara Novak, chaplain to this process,

who has guided the prayer life of the parish during this time.

Almighty God, giver of every good gift, look graciously on the people of St. John’s Cathedral. Be with us and lead us as we seek our next Dean. We pray especially for our Chapter. We pray for patience and discernment, strength and endurance, so that, in all of their deliberations, they may be guided by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Music at the Cathedral

We continue our celebration at St. John's of the season of Easter through the feast of Pentecost, falling early this year on May 20. On **April 29**, the Cathedral Choir sings New York-based Ola Gjeilo's setting of the text, *Ubi caritas*, mirroring the Epistle text, "Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God," with its sung text, "Where charity and love are found, God is there." The Cathedral Ringers offer two pieces on this Sunday: a setting of Gustav Holst's tune, THAXTED, borrowed from his composition, *The Planets*. As a festive prelude, Dr. Stan McDaniel leads the ringers in "Prepare the Royal Highway," an arrangement of a Swedish tune that will make use of St. John's new 2-octave Malmark Choir Chimes. This set of chimes has been generously donated by Vicki Adelquist and her family. We are most grateful for your generosity, Vicky, and we look forward to the additional opportunities this presents for adding to the beauty of liturgies at St. John's.

Tenor choral scholar apprentice Nicholas Fritschler leads the congregation on Bloomsday Sunday, **May 6**, offering a solo selection with Dr. John Bodinger.

Ascension Sunday coincides with Mother's Day on **May 13**, and the Junior Choir will offer an anthem on this, their last Sunday of the year. It is also at this liturgy that we recognize the growth of our Junior Choristers under the skillful direction of Tamara Schupman. The Cathedral Choir will sing Gerald Finzi's hallmark Ascension organ anthem, *God is gone up*.

St. John's will host the second annual **World Relief Spokane Concert** on **Friday, May 11**, at

6pm. Titled "Not Forgotten," this benefit concert for refugees will include a diverse group of performers: the Neema Youth Choir, the Pilgrim Orchestra, St. John's Adult and Junior Choirs, and Crescendo Community Chorus. Suggested donation is \$20, but all are welcome to this event. Join us for a vibrant musical celebration of Spokane's refugee community!

The Cathedral Choir's last Sunday before summer recess falls on Pentecost, **May 20**. As we draw near to this last Sunday, I wish to extend thanks on behalf of the St. John's community to our music ministers who rehearse in our three music ensembles faithfully every week, out of a love for prayer through song, for liturgy, and for a community that seeks to embrace God's love through art and action. We could not do this without our outstanding leaders.

Special thanks to Dr. Billie Severtsen for her artistic playing at our Saturday evening liturgies, to Jim Holmes for serving as substitute organist, and to Byrl Cinnamon for his early morning carillon ringing. Thank you to Brendan Biele, who provides logistic and sound support at liturgies and St. John's Music Series. Thank you to the directors of our Cathedral Ringers, Dr. Stan McDaniel, and our Junior Choir, Tamara Schupman, for your dual focus on ministry and musicianship: your leadership deepens our prayer experience. In the Cathedral Choir, we are grateful for the singing leadership of our choral scholars: Andrea Olsen, Amanda Glover, Nicholas Fritschler, Eric Betz, and Joshua Vander Plaats. And certainly not least, we are grateful for the humble service of our outstanding organist, Dr. John Bodinger. We extend our deepest thanks to all of you and look forward to a resplendent return in the fall.

Doing Christ's Work Together

Happy Easter everybody! Children and Youth Ministries are extremely active during this time of the year. We have many new and exciting things happening!

On a typical Sunday morning, Sunday school will be provided at the majority of the services we have. Currently, I provide an 8am Whirl Lectionary-based curriculum that follows the reading that the parents hear in church. At the 9am family service, we have offered a unique, welcoming Eucharist with energetic participation and an interactive liturgy that is suited for families with small children. This service is about a half an hour. A Godly Play story is told during the sermon time. At the 10:30am service, we offer two Sunday School programs. In the Nursery, we offer the Whirl Lectionary curriculum for children five and younger. In the Sunday School room

in the office suite, children six and older learn lectionary-based stories through a Lectio Divina style program utilizing Legos as the symbolic tool to share their versions of the story. You can find the Legos in the Welcome Center after the 10:30am service.

I'm currently discerning whether we should continue some of our Sunday School programming throughout the summer. In the past and in many churches, Sunday School programming halts for the summer since many parents and children are busy; however, we still have kids that come to church nearly every week. Please let me know if you would like continued programming for your children.

In addition to the busy Sunday School schedule, many of our staff have noticed that there has been interest from our children to learn about Holy Communion. I purchased several books titled, *This Bread & This Cup*, by Mary Wile, that walk your child through a regular Episcopal liturgy and teach them the basics for understanding Holy Communion. This is a wonderful tool for parents too! You can find them on the Children and Youth hall table as you exit the Welcome Center and head towards the Great Hall. Please take a book!

Young Eagles met last Sunday, April 22, to get their hands dirty and learn from our Master Gardener, Ginny. Our older Elementary and Middle school children are learning the meaning of serving others and caring for God's beautiful creation. If you have a child that is interested in participating in a community similar to youth group, please reach out to me.

Our Cathedral Youth Group is also in a time of transition. The dynamics and participation of our members have been changing over the course of this year. This has opened the opportunity to discern the purpose and the time frame when we meet. What an exciting time! In addition to these changing dynamics, Mallory Davis (Youth

Minister at St. Stephen's) and I have been engaging in joint ministry together. We have been approaching nearby Episcopal congregations that don't have a youth group to participate in the programs that we provide at the Cathedral. Of course, these communities are also expected to support their youth in their congregations and in our Youth Group programming. There are so many Episcopal churches in the area that it makes sense to provide a Spokane-centric Youth Group that meets at the Cathedral. This opens the opportunity for all of us, as Episcopalians, to engage in youth ministry together. I fully believe that this will enhance all of our communities as we jointly engage in formation.

Our confirmation class for youth has started. We have eight youth that have registered to participate in learning about our faith tradition as they prepare to be confirmed. The Bishop will have her official visitation date on **June 3**, which will be our Confirmation Sunday. We meet for about an hour after the 10:30am service each week and we will work our way through different topics about our faith tradition.

Graduation Sunday is quickly approaching at the Cathedral! On **Sunday, May 20**, our we will celebrate our youth that are graduating through a wonderful liturgy. In the interest of not wanting to miss anyone, please send me an email as soon as possible if you know of any high school seniors from our Cathedral family that are graduating.

The inaugural Youth Labor of Love is happening at Camp Cross! This is a mission project that the senior high youth dreamt up that is going to happen! This group will include ALL those entering 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th grades and graduating seniors. Plenty of Volunteer Hours to be had here, so bring your forms and Skip will sign them! From the Senior Warden

Chapter usually meets the third Tuesday of the month at 6:30pm in the Conference room. It is an open meeting; parishioners are welcome to observe. This month we postponed the business meeting until the 4th Tuesday (April 24) because on the 17th, the Dean Call Committee, Bishop Rehberg and Canon Susan Cleveley presented the Chapter with the short list of candidates for Dean. Chapter has met half a dozen times over the last six weeks to prepare ourselves for discernment. Our business meeting this month will include reports from the Foundation by Russell Werkman, a report on St John's properties by Bruce Miller, a report on Marsden Scholarships (Russell Werkman reporting on behalf of the Committee), a report on outreach grant recipients for 2018 (I will report for Judy Beane and subcommittee), a proposal on renovation of the Coombs Library by Junior Warden Katherine Karr-Carnejo, and committee reports from Communications (Nic Mather), Outreach (Gretchen Ramey and me), Property (Jason Brown, Kristi and me) and Finance (Karen Martin).

All that Chapter work is necessary, and yet some of our most important work falls outside of Chapter. At the Spring Clean-Up on April 14, a few dozen parishioners spent the morning and into the afternoon cleaning up inside and out. Bill Selby and Doug Spruance coordinated that effort, thank you both. While the tangible benefit is obvious—the place looks sharp—the intangible benefits are just as important. There is hardly a better way to get to know somebody than conversation over common work. I learned about things Doug has done in his years at the Cathedral and before, about

his bicycling and accumulated orthopedic repairs from the accidents in his hard-charging life. Russell Werkman dropped a couple of ideas about the use of Jewett House and we talked about the role the church plays in connecting parishioners who are looking to serve God with the opportunities to do so. I met our new gardener, Ginny Barrett, someone so pleasant and in love with her work I wanted to follow her around. I watched Phil Ogden and Stan Fergen hedge trim for most of the morning, judiciously selecting the length of each branchlet to cut. I learned about Richie Parsons' cars (yes, our maintenance man has time for life outside of the Cathedral), and I met Andy Shields for the first time, sweeping the parking lot together. These were just the folks in my proximity; I'm sure similar conversations were happening all over the place. This congregation is blessed to have so many kind-hearted, talented, giving parishioners. Newcomers, come to work and get to know a few.

Finally, with the help of Gretchen Ramey and Mike Leiserson we will soon convene a meeting of front-line outreach leaders. It's been a while since we talked through the myriad outreach work that has been sustained by Cathedral parishioners. I have had a number of new opportunities brought to my attention. Outreach is so important for Christian formation; it's how we expand our understanding of the love of God for this whole world, God's world. Stay tuned. This is the beginning of renewed effort for the Cathedral to work, shoulder-to-shoulder for our larger community.

Book Cart Update

Many thanks to all those who support the Book Cart that is located in the hallway between the Welcome Center and the Great Hall, by both donating books and purchasing them. As many of you know, the Book Cart supported our efforts in Haiti for the past nine years. During that nine-year period, we were able to



send an additional \$4,007 to the school from Book Cart sales. We have ended our partnership with St. André School, but decided to keep the Book Cart going and to use the funds collected to support the Stephen R. Novak Foundation and its work in Nepal. The Foundation supports the Tilganga Eye Center in Kathmandu, the Joy Foundation Nepal, and Mountain People. These organizations provide medical care, education, sanitation and water systems to many people in the hill tribe villages.

The Foundation is run by Deacon, Barbara Novak. She and her husband, Terry Novak, began the Foundation to honor their son Steve who died in 1995. He ran a business, Far East Handicrafts, which sold handcrafted items made by the people of the hill tribes of Nepal. He ran the business on Fair Trade principles, making sure craftspeople were paid fair wages in their cultural context and were able to send their children to school. The Foundation was a way to carry on the work done by Steve.

The Cathedral has given support to the Stephen R. Novak Foundation for many years through the Leuthold Funds distribution. We are happy to be able to provide some additional support through Book Cart sales.

From the Priest Associate

For those who don't know, this summer the 79th General Convention of the Episcopal Church will convene in Austin, Texas, July 4-13. General Convention is the governing body of The Episcopal Church, meeting in two houses: the House of Deputies, consisting of equal lay and clergy from each diocese (and an Official Youth Presence with only seat and voice consisting of 2 youth from each Province), and the House of Bishops. In these two houses, issues from around the church will be debated, resolutions passed or rejected, and even fundamental shifts undertaken.

The 79th General Convention promises to be very interesting as the church will (hopefully) tackle its role (both positively and negatively) in the #MeToo movement, how we address issues of substance abuse in a faithful manner, and the big one: possible prayer book revision. These are some of the early topics that everyone is talking about, but many more issues will come to the floor as both houses look to set the direction for the Episcopal Church for the next three years (it's such an undertaking to hold GC, that it only happens every three years), and find the funding to live into that direction.

I too will be at General Convention, and while I am an Alternate Deputy for the Diocese of Spokane, I'm not on the line-up card so-to-speak, and instead am serving as part of a team of folks from all across the church that are putting together the Young Adult Festival. The Young Adult Festival is specifically geared towards those who are 18-30(ish) years old, and helps young adults in the church do many things: connect

to other young adults in fellowship and formation opportunities, connect to the wider Episcopal Church missions and ministries, network with organizations looking for the next generation of leaders in the church, and experience what General Convention is and how it operates. From encouraging participation in legislative hearings to sitting in the gallery on the floor of the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops to festival-only one-on-one time with special guests and speakers to exploring the exhibition hall, young adults from throughout the church will have a can't-miss opportunity to connect with each other and our church.

The Young Adult Festival will run July 4-9, beginning with fireworks and ending with a Commissioning Eucharist, with everything in between being an amazing opportunity to grow in faith and knowledge of The Episcopal Church.

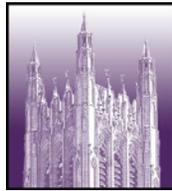
