Paul-Gordon Chandler and Kahlil Gibran

Paul-Gordon Chandler, author, interfaith advocate, and Episcopal Priest, will be returning to Spokane following the release of his most recent book, *In Search of a Prophet; A Spiritual Journey with Kahlil Gibran*.

On Saturday, September 23 at 7pm, Paul-Gordon Chandler will give a talk at West Central Episcopal Mission, taking listeners on a fascinating journey through the spiritual life of Kahlil Gibran, exploring this beloved writer, artist and mystic who sought to build bridges and tear down walls. Chandler reveals how Gibran's all -embracing approach serves as a much needed guide in our times. The presentation focuses on how Gibran's spiritual journey touches on the most critical issues we face today: care for creation, equality for women, interest in spirituality as opposed to religion, inclusive embrace of different faiths, and learning from the best in each tradition to enhance one's own.


The presentation will transition into a brief contemplative service incorporating stillness, darkness, candlelight, meditative Middle Eastern music, images of Gibran's art and spiritual readings from Gibran's writings.

Stop by the Reception Hall afterwards for a book-signing and reception. Simple Middle Eastern fare will be served and Paul-Gordon Chandler's new book will be available for purchase.

From the Interim Vicar

Two of my grandchildren are starting high school this year. A third is starting middle school. The two who are high school juniors are exploring college possibilities. Those two families, one in Seattle and one near Chicago, are living into some interesting years of transition. One of these days they will be empty-nesters.

Of course our lives are always in transition. We move to new cities, change jobs, add children to our families, retire, choose a new house or apartment, adjust to a change in health, or experience any number of life-changing events. It has been said that all of life is about transition of some kind. Our lives are a process of growth and change where we experience both blessing and challenge.

It comes as no surprise that our life as a Cathedral community is in the midst of a transition this year. Bill Ellis, who served so effectively as Dean for the past 11 years has retired and moved back to Bend, OR where he and Beth will live a different kind of life in their own transition to retirement. Our life here is different, too, as we move ahead toward a calling a new Dean to serve among us.

Times of transition are both exciting and challenging. Exciting because they open possibilities and challenging because some things that are stable and familiar are changing. Sometimes we struggle to cope with or understand what is going on around us.

One resource I've found helpful, especially while working with churches in transition, is the book *Transitions: Making Sense of Life's Changes* by William Bridges.

Bridges divides transitions into

three stages: "Ending, Losing and Letting Go," "The Neutral Zone," and "The New Beginning."

The first stage, "Ending," can be disorienting because we must let go of something (or someone) that we are comfortable with. We entered that stage when Dean Ellis announced that he would be leaving at the end of June. When that kind of change begins, there can be sadness, frustration, uncertainty and fear.

The second stage, "The Neutral Zone," is a little further along on the journey of transition and may find us confused, uncertain or impatient. This is part of living into a new reality of how we function as a community. Some may experience a higher workload while adapting to the change. In churches this certainly includes lay leadership and staff who are asked to take on more responsibility.

The third stage, "The New Beginning," is most often a time of acceptance and energy. Through the previous stages people have begun to embrace the change, building new skills and are renewing their commitment, as a new Dean begins her or his ministry here.

Those three stages are sometimes compared to the biblical account of the Exodus from Egypt and journey to the promised land. The Hebrews, in the "Ending" stage, fled from Egypt where they had lived under oppression.

Their Neutral Zone was their long journey through the wilderness. As you recall, there were many challenges during that that wilderness journey: questioning leadership, finding nourishment, staying faithful, complaining, even a nostalgic longing for the good old days in Egypt. Churches in transition often discover their own journey through the wilderness includes

some of these dynamics. Their New Beginning was reaching the Promised Land.

This quick overview of William Bridges' insights may be helpful to us as we continue on our own transitional journey. I think it is healthy to be aware of some of the dynamics we may experience, rather than be taken by surprise.

It helps to enter into times like this with optimism, patience and courtesy and prayer. We are all on this journey together and it can be exciting and insightful. We trust we will get to the promised land before long. We trust that God is our companion. And we trust that this a community that will journey well.

Several years ago I wrote this prayer with congregations in transition in mind:

A Prayer for Transitions

Ever-present God, you call us on a journey to a place we do not know.

We are not where we started. We have not reached our destination.

We are not sure where we are or who we are.

This is not a comfortable place. Be among us, we pray. Calm our fears, save us from discouragement, and help us to stay on course.

Open our hearts to your guidance so that our journey to this unknown place continues as a journey of trust. Amen

The Cathedral music ensembles return to rehearsals and liturgy this month, eager to rejoin with one another in our musical and faith community. Through our anthems and leading of hymns, we strive to proclaim the Gospel message through song and ringing. Why do we gather each Sunday and lift our voices in song? Why do these music ministers commit themselves to refining music each week? Beyond the inherent joy in doing so, songs of faith help us understand why we are here. They deepen our relationship with a God whose love knows no bounds. They guide us in how we are to live.

The scriptures this month guide us to live in right relationship with God, ourselves, and one another. The Junior and Cathedral Choirs join together for our first Sunday back on September 10. **Love** and charity resound in scripture and in Ola Gjeilo's modern **Ubi caritas** setting.

On September 17, **Praise** resounds in **Lobe den Herren** (Praise to the Lord) by Hugo Distler, a German organist and composer whose struggle with the Nazi rule sadly led him to take his life. In spite of this, his music reminds us that great beauty can come even in times of darkness. On the same Sunday, the Shaker Song **Lay me low** guides us

to humility.

On September 24, American composer Randall Thompson's **The Last Words of David** nobly guides us to **integrity**, particularly among those who lead. A setting of the poetic Song of Songs by Edward Bairstow, **I sat down under His Shadow**, is an anthem of great comfort and celebration of a resplendent banquet in God's house.

On October 1, the Junior and Cathedral Choirs both lead our celebration of the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi. We join together to sing John Rutter's For the Beauty of the Earth as we bless animals, and we recall the loving source of all creation through a setting of Dante's *Paradiso*, The Wheel that Moves the Sun and the Stars.

Mark your calendars for several special musical offerings. On September 17, **Ivana Cojbasic** offers a free piano recital at 3pm in the Cathedral nave. Donations support St. John's Cathedral music ministry.

The Cathedral Kantorei and Collegium Orchestra will present J. S. Bach's masterwork, the **B minor mass**, on Sunday, November 12 at 3pm. Spanning the utmost yearning and joy of our humanity, this composition is one of the greatest sacred masterworks. Details to follow on ticket purchase.

I close with words from the late
American conductor, Robert Shaw.
The son of a preacher, his musicmaking reminds us of a greater
mission through our song:
"In this time of political, economic,
and personal disintegration,
music is not a luxury,
it is a necessity;
Not simply because it is therapeutic,
Nor because it is the universal lan-

guage, but because it is the persistent focus of

our intelligence, aspiration and good will."

Soli Deo gloria!

Christian Formation

It has been a pleasure working with the Cathedral staff and fellow parishioners over the past two months preparing for this upcoming academic year! I'm looking forward to joining all of our children and youth as we dive into a deeper relationship with Christ and each other, coming to know God and serving others as disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world. This year, our children and youth ministries will focus on becoming Missioners of the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus movement. We will strive towards achieving this goal by using the Camp Cross theme, "Many Parts, One Body" as part of our programming for children and youth ministries.

In addition to the Christian formation provided at the Cathedral, I will be providing the children, youth, and parents with a scripture reading and a few questions to ponder during the school week. With help from our parents, these readings work in tandem with Sunday School each week. It is our goal that these readings could be incorporated in the home during dinner or homework time.

Another form of formation is teaching children about Jesus' radical love for others is through service learning. One family spends time at 2nd Harvest assembling food kits for hungry children that live in the Spokane area. Another family hosts refugees in their home, showing Christ's love to others through hospitality. Serving and loving our neighbor is a key component of living out our faith. With your help, Christian formation won't just happen once a week, but it will be lived out on a daily basis.

Christian Formation is a cumulation of learning and living out faith throughout one's life.

Through learning and action, we are formed to be the hands and feet of Christ on earth. We develop a greater understanding of love for one another. We become disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world.

Nursery

The Nursery will be open on Sundays, 9am-noon. There will be opportunities for our youngest members to learn about the Bible and Jesus during those hours. At this time, we are upgrading our Nursery facilities and updating our policies. At the beginning of the year, parents will need to fill out a Nursery Registration Form which will be used as a way to log pertinent information for our Nursery Supervisor and Attendants. Thank you for being patient during this time of transition.

Sunday School (ages 1-5 and 6-12)

Sunday school will be offered during the 8am and 10:30am service.

At the 8am service, we will start Sunday School near the Welcome Center in the office suite.

At 10:30am, children are invited to sit with their family in the

Church and come up just after the Collect for blessings. After the blessing, children can follow myself and volunteers to their Sunday School rooms for their lesson.

Children ages 1-5 will go to the Nursery (you may sign in your children into the Nursery before the service) for a lectionary-based Bible Study and children ages 6-12 may join me near the Welcome Center in the office suite for a lectionary-based Sunday School using Legos.

At the Passing of the Peace, children may join their families in the Sanctuary for Holy Communion.

Children's Forum (ages 1-12)

During the 9am Forum, children ages 1-12 are welcome to join me for a Children's Forum that will focus on learning to love like God through Bible stories and illustration. We will meet near the Nursery every Sunday when a forum is scheduled. We will explore other topics throughout the year pertaining to living a Christian life. Youth, ages 13 and up, are invited to join the forum at 9 am in the Great Hall.

Young Eagles (grades 3-6)

Our pre-teens will have a youth group opportunity on the third Sunday of each month at 5pm in the Community Room! We will focus on building our community through dinner, fellowship, and games. We will also work our way through parts of the Bible that directly tell us about loving our neighbor. As a group, we will engage in service learning, living out Jesus' calling for us to be disciples of Christ and serve Christ through others. All youth (grades 3 -6) and their parents are welcome to attend. Dinner will be provided and as always, youth are welcome to bring their friends along for the evening's activities.

Youth Group (grades 7-12)

Youth Group will begin on Wednesday, August 30, 6pm-8pm. We will meet downstairs in the Community and Youth Rooms. The Youth Group is for all youth in 7th - 12th grades. We will focus on service learning and become disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world. We will learn what it means to be part of the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus movement and serve Christ in others. This means that we will be going on field trips to serve others. At most youth group gatherings, we will begin with a meal.

Youth Group is a time for youth to gather together to be with friends that come from many different schools, creating a special community where they discover Jesus through sharing and asking difficult questions in a safe environment. Friends are always welcome!

Guest Preacher and Presenter

On *Sunday, November 5*, we will welcome The Rev. Becca Stevens as a special guest preacher and presenter, made possible by the Leuthold Honorarium Fund.

Becca Stevens is an author, speaker, priest, social entrepreneur, founder and president of <u>Thistle Farms</u> (thistlefarms.org), a sanctuary for survivors of trafficking, violence and addiction.

We will welcome Becca and women from Thistle Farms as presenters at our Forum, and Becca will preach at the 10:30am service. This fall the Commonplace group (open to ALL aged 20s/30s/40s) will read her new book, *Love Heals*, for our book study. If you are a Commonplace participant (or want to be!) let Father Nic know asap if you are interested in the book study, which will meet at the Iron Goat Brewery, each Monday in October at 7pm.

From the Priest Associate

This fall at St. John's Cathedral, we will spend our Forum hour time (Sundays 9:15am-10:15am) discussing an important and necessary area of the ministry we are called to live into as followers of Christ: Mission and Outreach.

Many of us already hold notions as to what mission and outreach mean. We think of the mission trip we took as a youth, or the outreach budget that is part of the Cathedral's budget line. But, what do we actually know of mission and outreach, and what do we know of the active work that is being done in our community and our world, following in the footsteps of Christ?

First, Mission and Outreach are not the same thing. Mission is the ministry work commissioned by a religious institution for humanitarian work. Outreach is a program or plan designed to find people who need help rather than waiting for them to ask for it. But, even with this (admittedly small) difference, mission and outreach are intimately tied to one another as the work that we do in both mission and outreach serves others as much as it serves us, as we learn and grow from the work that we do while serving others.

Jesus Christ left a model of ministry for us that has its foundation in the service of others. In Matthew 25:31-46, we hear Jesus speak of His return and how we will be judged on our ability to provide food, drink, welcome, clothing, care, and presence to "the least of these," for "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

And how do we go about providing for "the least of these"?

What is the work that we are called to do in this place, at this time? By the end of this fall, our hope is that you will be able to answer this question with confidence having digested and interacted with presentations by special guest speakers, an honest look at what we currently do, and a conversation about what we want to see for the future of this work in this place.

And, this is not a conversation that is limited to adults! The Forum hour this fall will be engaging and educational and we invite and welcome those who are in middle school and high school to be a part of this conversation in helping shape the future of this work.

I encourage you to attend the Forum hour this fall, and become an active voice for the work of mission and outreach in this place, in this town, in this world.


