90th Annual Meeting

All Cathedral members are encouraged to attend the Annual Meeting on **Sunday, January 26**.

We have a change in the schedule this year. We will have one morning service—Eucharist Rite II at 9:30am. **The Annual Meeting will follow this service, starting at approximately 10:45am.** Coffee and muffins will be provided.

Nursery care will be provided during the Annual Meeting.

What happens at the Annual Meeting?

- The Chapter provides the proposed 2020 budget for congregational approval.
- Those present elect delegates to the October 2020 Diocesan convention.
- Those present elect four persons to 3-year terms on Chapter.
- Annual Reports from Finance, Trust & Endowment, guilds, standing committees and staff are presented.

Most of the Annual Reports will be available a week prior to the meeting.

Information about the candidates for four openings on the Chapter will be posted on the bulletin board outside the Great Hall soon.

Sunday Forum: Exploring the Prayer Book

Continuing with this year's theme of "Faith, Hope, and Love," we're excited to explore the richness of the 1979 Book of Common Prayer, our church's primary resource for public worship as well as a rich resource for private devotion. Prayer is the way we grapple with God, asking in hope that God's kingdom would come, God's will be done.

Our hope is that focusing on the Book of Common Prayer will allow us to hear our liturgy anew and see how this book is living document. In the process, we hope to understand a bit better how it has shaped the Anglican tradition we're a part of.

January 5: The Genealogy of the Prayer Book / In this session, we will explore where our prayer book comes from. We'll touch on its history and what it means for us as Episcopalians to have a Book of Common Prayer.

January 12: Theology of the 1979 Prayer Book / Having explored the history of our Prayer Book, we will turn to look at how our prayer shapes our belief, how our liturgy just is, in many ways, our theology.

January 19: Baptism / We will begin to look at specific sections of the Prayer Book and what the Prayer Book has to teach us about the sacraments. During this session, we will pay close attention to the baptismal liturgy and ask just what baptism is.

February 2: Eucharist / This week, we will discuss the Holy Eucharist. We will look at the overarching structure of the liturgy, and we'll ask what the liturgy teaches us about the holy mysteries.

February 9: Liturgy of the Word / This week will focus on the first part of the Eucharistic Rite. We will explore why we have the particular readings we have. What does it mean to say, "The Word of the Lord"?

February 16: Liturgy of the Table / This week will focus on the second part of the Eucharistic Rite. We will explore a range of Eucharistic Prayers. We will crack open the words we pray every week so that we might hear them as though for the first time.

February 23: Conclusions, looking forward / In the concluding session, we will look at other Episcopal liturgies as well as what the future holds for the Book of Common Prayer.

From the Dean

Dear Cathedral Family,

Here we are at a new year, a new decade (depending on how you count things), and an opportunity to re-new ourselves. Some of you may be New Year's resolution kind of people. Others of you may save that sort of personal work for Lent as you give up and take on things in order to intentionally become closer to God. In the spirit of *via media*, I say why not live into both.

Resolutions are an opportunity for a course correction in our lives. Those that ask us to make a 180 degree turn tend to not stick – the “I’m going to go to the gym every day now” kind of resolution when you haven’t gone in years. But the smaller course corrections are the things that I think we can live into in our lives. In my life and that of my family, we have some physical health work to do of getting back to healthier eating and smaller portions, as well as getting to the Y to work out more than once a week. We also have some family wellness work to do of expanding our time spent with each other and not in front of screens. We know that we are pulled by the demands on our time by work (since neither David nor I work a 9 to 5 job) and the demands of our children’s homework and activities; yet we want to return to an intentionality in the way our family lives. None of these are unique course corrections and may mirror what you are doing now or have done in years past. In all of this, we hope to live more God-centered lives, again with gratitude and intentionality.

At the feast of the Epiphany, which we will mark in worship on January 5, we focus on the journey of the Magi, the wise men

that tradition has turned into three kings. In Matthew 2:1-2 (Common English Bible version here) we read this, “After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in the territory of Judea during the rule of King Herod, magi came from the east to Jerusalem. They asked, ‘Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We’ve seen his star in the east, and we’ve come to honor him.’” Scripture says nothing about how they got on this journey and so we use our Scriptural and spiritual imaginations to live into the bare words of the text. I wonder how these magi decided to undertake this journey. What was the sign in the star that caused them to leave their homes, studies, and ways of life? Was this journey to seek God Emmanuel in the Christ Child part of a course correction in their lives? I believe that they trusted in the divine sign, even if they did not know that the sign was a gift from God as we know God. I believe that they were changed in their encounter with Jesus – so much so that they would have gone home by another route even if Herod had not been enraged and planning slaughter of innocent blood.

As a congregation, St. John’s is seeking to follow God as manifest in Jesus Christ. We are learning more and more to walk in the Way of Love. We are trying to invite and connect more with our neighborhood, with Spokane and the wider region, and with our sister congregations in the Diocese of Spokane. We are reaching out to all sorts and kinds of individuals, couples, and families with the hope that they will find a faith home at the Cathedral. Sometimes it is clear what we are doing; other times we need some course corrections as well. My prayer is that we are listening to each other and are listening to

where and how God is leading us.

In that spirit, I invite you to come to special worship and the Cathedral’s Annual Meeting on January 26. We will worship at one service that morning, starting at 9:30am, and then move from the Nave into the Great Hall for the annual meeting. As in years past, reports from various parts of the Cathedral’s common life will be offered and elections for Chapter and diocesan representatives will be held. We will also spend some time together to celebrate revitalized ministries, to listen together for ways that God is calling the Cathedral to be, and to look to our shared future. Children’s activities and nursery care will be available and there will be ample coffee hour goodies to share. I hope that you will come.

At this time last year, I named 2018 as *Transition* and 2019 as *Openings*. For 2020, I think that *Reaching* is the name for this year. We reach out to each other for support and to help, as well as show our love for one another. We reach out to invite and to welcome. We reach and stretch out of our comfort zone, following the leading of God.

May your course corrections and your steadiness be held in and upheld by God in this new year. See you at church.

The Outreach Committee supports various organizations that minister to some of our most vulnerable neighbors. We would like to present a few volunteer opportunities for you to consider as we move into the new year.

Meals on Wheels (MOW) Spokane “provides hot, nutritious meals to elderly and disabled individuals living within the Spokane City limits who are homebound, unable to provide or prepare nutritious meals and meet vulnerability criteria.” St. John’s Cathedral participates in this program by providing volunteers every five weeks, Monday-Thursday mornings. We are in need of more drivers and “runners” to help deliver the meals. If you are able to volunteer or would like more information, please contact Doug Beane, (509)991-6588.

West Central Episcopal Mission (WCEM) is an outreach program of the Spokane Episcopal Diocese. Dinners are served every Wednesday at the Commons, adjacent to Holy Trinity Church in the West Central neighborhood. Through sharing a meal, WCEM strives to foster a sense of community with our guests.

The Annual Meeting

The first time I attended an annual meeting back in Bethesda was the first time I’d given any thought to how the church gets its work done. I’d come to worship, got the kids into Sunday school, and I enjoyed meeting parishioners at coffee hour. But the business of church was something I could let others do. I didn’t need to know what the budget was, didn’t need to vote for vestry members. Those things would go on with or without me.

Some years later when I was working at Wyeth Pharmaceuticals I saw a very different image of the “annual meeting.” People filed into a giant room with music blaring, and a rapid-fire series of quick talks generated a confidence that the business was set for a good year. Bernard Poussot, the CEO, was an accomplished speaker and told of the drugs that had launched and the drugs near to launch, and showed video clips of responders in clinical trials whose lives were grabbed back from the clutches of debilitating disease. The science was at the leading edge of biology. I felt I was a part of a machine that ran the gamut. We learned where drugs were needed, figured what molecules might work, tested the ones with the best chance, built the facilities to manufacture the one that worked, and sold those, all efficiently. The persons I worked with were so very competent; it was all I could do to try to keep up and play

From the Priest Associate

What do you love about the Cathedral of St. John's? On a Friday night in December, St. John's hosted families with young children for dinner and conversation. We had representation from our growing Sunday School initiative, our choir, and from long-standing members of the Cathedral community. We also had families who were disappointed to miss because of holiday appointments. After dinner we talked together about what we love about this community and what we love about raising children in this community. Here's what I heard:

"The Cathedral welcomes my children." Parents experience this community going out of its way to engage them and their kids, create spaces of accommodation and welcome, and serve their sense of belonging here. It can be a challenge for churches to welcome children as they don't always play by the rules of "adult decorum." Thank God they don't, because we don't want children to be adults and Jesus set an example for us by placing what he called, "the little ones," in places of honor in the community life. It was heartening to hear our parents say they experience this welcome here!

"The Cathedral welcomes me." Our families come from a wide variety of geographic and denominational backgrounds. Some connected to us because of the music, some because of their past and rich connection to the Episcopal way of being Christian, some because they are looking for a Christian community where you can bring your whole self, including your identity, sexuality, convictions, and questions. Our families want to raise their children in that

kind of Christian community, and they find that here. This speaks to years of growth and hard work in growing a culture of welcome and our families are grateful for that.

We also celebrated our Sunday School Teachers. We have a small handful of folks who have been leading a Sunday School initiative through the fall. Children gather at 9:15am between the services for an interactive, curious, artful, and prayerful time in the scriptures. Dean Heather spearheaded this prior to my arrival, and we are grateful to these teachers for cultivating this space for children. This is part of being welcoming, and welcoming in a particular way, towards that vision of community in which we are all discovering what it means to beloved children of God.

What can we do to build on this gift? We can be more welcoming. Let's reach out to new families and families we don't know. Let's look for ways to create welcome in our physical spaces, in our Cathedral volunteering, and in our hearts for families of the Cathedral and the larger Spokane community. When families in Spokane drive past our beautiful building, I would like them to know this a place where their family will be welcome regardless of how loud their kids are, or how different they feel, or what their questions and convictions are. Memorial Outdoor Labyrinth Gift

A gift proposal from the estate of our late parishioner, Dr. Polly McMahon, was reviewed and accepted by Chapter in December. The proposal is for a permanent outdoor, in-ground, Labyrinth. The Labyrinth will be approximately 30 feet in diameter and will be installed in the spring of 2020. The Labyrinth will be similar to one at All Saints Episcopal Church in Richland, WA. It will be constructed of stone or concrete pavers. The gift proposal also includes a recycled material bench where Labyrinth walkers can sit for reflection and prayer. The expenses for a dedication service for the Labyrinth were also included in the proposal. The exact location on Cathedral property will be determined by the Dean.

The goal is for the Labyrinth to be accessible for all people in the Spokane community. Polly was an active member of the Cathedral and the greater Spokane community. She developed and served as the Chair of Spokane Falls Community College's Gerontology and Social Services/Paraprofessional Programs. Polly's students carry her love into the community through their work. Polly accepted all and loved all greatly. The outdoor and accessible location of the Labyrinth will offer an inviting space for reflection and discovery for all. Nancy Cartwright (St. John's parishioner) and Judy Noel (Spokane Falls Community College), were Polly's "chosen" sisters and have guided the research on this proposal.



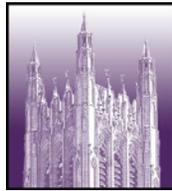


