Adult Formation This Fall: Finding "us" in God's Stories

Adult Formation returns to the Guild Rooms on Sundays, 9:15am-10:15am, **beginning September 15**. Over the course of this program year, we will continue our exploration of the theme "Faith, Hope, and Love," an exploration of the beliefs, practices, and resources of our Episcopal and Anglican heritage as we walk in the Way of Love. We began this summer in taking a look at some of the details of our worship space, and how they create meaning for us. This Fall, we will be working with Scripture, with a goal of equipping participants with tools to approach our sacred texts with curiosity and confidence.

In September and part of October we will be working with texts from the Old Testament, with presentations and conversations thinking about God's interaction with creation and the way we interact with God. Where can we find ourselves in God's stories? Begin-

ning mid-October and running through December, we will be participating in the diocesan-wide formation program following the work of Amy-Jill Levine in *Short Stories by Jesus*, exploring some of Jesus' most well-known parables in the light of their original audience to better understand how we might interpret them today.

Celebrating 50 years of our Carillon

On Christmas Eve 1968, St. John's organist/choirmaster, Harold Einecke, made his way up the tower to the carillonneur's playing cabin and played the melody line to "Silent Night" on the carillon. At that time the installation wasn't complete, but Dr. Einecke was able to play that tune for the congregation to hear on their new carillon.

The carillon had been donated to the Cathedral by William Greer of Chevy Chase, Maryland, the son-in-law of George Frederick Jewett. Mr. Greer was familiar with the carillon in the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., and wanted something similar for the cathedral here in Spokane. It was manufactured by the John Taylor & Co. Bellfoundry of Loughborough, England, and consists of 49 bells spanning a range of four octaves, the heaviest, "Big John," weighing approximately 5,000 pounds.

From the Dean

Dear Cathedral Family,

I have always enjoyed word play as well as the meanings behind words and sayings. I may not have as many puns on hand as our organist (and interim music coordinator) John Bodinger but I certainly enjoy those that he shares at the Cathedral's weekly staff meetings, groans and all. Maybe it is the combination of the final reviews of Greek and Latin roots by one of my kids and the back to school signal of fall, as well as the intentional work that the Cathedral has been engaged in over the summer, that has the words "welcome" and "hospitality" on my mind.

According to the *Oxford English Dictionary*, "welcome" can be 4 parts of speech: noun, exclamation, adjective, and verb. "Hospitality" comes from "hospital" in its Middle English understanding via Old French and Medieval Latin "hospitable." That is related to "host," which has 3 variants as a noun: a person who receives guests such as the host of a gathering, a large number of people or things as in a "host of angels gathered there," and also the bread that is consecrated in the Eucharist, known traditionally as the Host. One could say that each has the opportunity to be the *host* who draws others into the *host* of the Cathedral family as we come together at the altar to share in the *Host* – that is Jesus as present to us in the bread and the wine.

During the workweek, I hear staff and volunteers say "Welcome to the Cathedral" with joy to the tourists and visitors who come to visit our building and who come to pray. Many are

genuinely excited that they can actually go into the Cathedral and have time and space to be – that it is accessible across much of the day and not just when tours are scheduled. Many find refuge and solace within its walls and in this space where you can feel your prayer joining the host of prayers spoken out loud and in hearts for the past ninety years. This warm welcome offers hospitality to those who come to visit and truly makes them feel as they are not just tourists but our guests.

Starting with the Welcome Bash on Sunday, September 8, we will have trained greeters at the Cathedral entrances prior to the 10:30am service. We know that some folks just want to come into the Cathedral to worship God in quiet and anonymity but more people want to be greeted and welcomed, especially folks who are new to the Cathedral. In addition to offering a warm welcome to all who come within our doors, the focus for the greeters ministry is to engage with those who are new to the Cathedral, whether as tourists from out of town or visitors who might be church shopping and seeking a new community. That said, St. John's is big enough that not everyone knows everyone else on sight! So if you have been coming to the Cathedral for the past 17 years, please do not take offense if you are greeted warmly by one of our greeters. Just take a second to introduce yourself, thank them for their share in this ministry, and pass along the welcome to others. Meet someone new in the pews around you or at coffee hour.

Each person at the Cathedral has the opportunity to share that hospitality and to offer a warm welcome. See you on Sunday.

Greetings from the Mountain

After a 3 ½ day trip of 22000+ miles through 9 states, I have safely arrived at The University of the South, aka "Sewanee." The university and the School of Theology sit atop the Cumberland Plateau, a 13,000 acre forested location that is known as "The Domain" and affectionately as the "Mountain." From the Memorial Cross on the west end of campus one can look for miles over the Tennessee Valley. I am convinced this is the place for me to spend the next year in academic and community life.

The incoming first-year class of 31 is predominately from areas in the south and southeast. While I am the only student from the West Coast, we have four students from outside the United States: from Newfoundland, Burundi, Malawi, and Mozambique. Their individual stories are fascinating and unlike me, they're planning on being here the full three years of seminary. They certainly bring different perspectives on worship and we've had a lot of laughs getting to know one another. The overall class is beginning to gel and build relationships and is a good mix of men and women, ages and church experiences. The staff and faculty have been incredibly welcoming and helpful and I look forward to learning from both students and the academic folks.

I've spent the past week of official orientation attending a variety of required training classes and getting to know my fellow classmates. The Middlers and Seniors started arriving late last week and we all begin classes on Tuesday, August 27. I will be attending classes in Old Testament, New Testament, Pastoral Liturgics and ... Beginning Hebrew. This Hebrew class will probably have no more than 5 students, all new students to the seminary, and I've been guaranteed by the professor that we'll have a great time together.

On Thursday, August 28, 1969, at 4pm, the dedication of the carillon took place. After the Service of Dedication, the dedicatory recital was performed. Dr. Einecke had been slated to play the recital but had unfortunately been hospitalized in Sacred Heart. A young man from the Yale University Guild of Carillonneurs, Robert Bonds, ended up playing the program, as he was going to play two Yale songs as duets with Einecke anyway. (Greer was a Yale alumnus.)

In celebration of the 50th anniversary of that dedication concert, on **Sunday, September 8**, we will hear a carillon concert played by Wesley Arai, the carillonneur who has played our July 4th carillon concerts for the last ten years. Wesley is the University Carillonist at UC Santa Barbara and has concertized across the U.S., in Canada, in Australia, and next summer will be playing at a carillon festival in France. He will provide most of the prelude music at the 10:30am service as well as the postlude, and then an hour's worth of music after that during the Welcome Bash. A lot of it will not be what you typically hear on a Sunday morning, as he will include some popular favorites. I understand the Dean is looking forward to some Beatles songs.

I hope you all will make a special effort to help us celebrate this special occasion by attending the service that day and enjoying both the carillon music and the Welcome Bash.

Children's Formation Update

In the winter and spring of 2019, the clergy met with the volunteer Sunday school teachers and some parents to discuss how Sunday school happens at St. John's. While there was appreciation of the Lego Sunday school curriculum, there was also a desire to make some changes. In the spirit of entrepreneurship, a core of teachers stepped up to try something different for the fall of 2019.

Starting on **Sunday, September 15, Sunday School** will meet 9:15am-10:15am next to the Nursery. This is for preschoolers through elementary aged kids (3 year olds through 5th graders). They will start with 15 minutes of music with Brendan Biele and then move into the curriculum time. Lisa Church and Seth Robertson have looked at the Godly Play resources that the Cathedral has—and we have a lot! The fall will start with the basics of the church year and stories from the Hebrew Bible / Old Testament. Between presenting the story, working with it in the class, and having table fellowship (aka snack), the rest of the class time should be rich.

Having Sunday School between the morning services will allow for families to attend the 8am or 10:30am services. It will also allow for parents to participate in the Adult Forum.

This concept presents a different approach to charity. Rather than simply giving, ABCD strives to empower at-risk individuals to work together to find long term solutions to the problems they face. The West Central Development Project is following this approach. Working with Dinner Table (an outreach effort of the West Central Episcopal Mission) participants and Spokane Alliance, they have identified affordable housing as the most important obstacle faced by members of West Central. They are now identifying

various strategies and obstacles so they can move forward.

From the Canon Associate

Kitchen remodeling is a journey. This summer was my first real kitchen remodel – ever. The good news is that it went amazingly well. That doesn't mean that it wasn't chaotic at times – especially the times when I had to search the house for some common kitchen item that had been stored in the most illogical place. Why is the pizza cutter in the guest room closet?

But the thing I noticed most was the skill and pride of everyone who worked on the project. Two cabinet installers pretty much demolished the existing kitchen in record time. Not a scrap of debris was left in the house or yard. The cabinets were up in no time at all – beautifully inserted into the ragged spaces where the old ones had been and finished off with trim.

The tile installer said he considered himself to be an artist and he was correct. He did beautiful and artistic work in the spaces around the sink. He showed me photos of some of his larger projects that looked like they belonged in the museum of bathrooms – if such a place exists.

A new floor was not in the original plan, but became a necessity because of the geometry of the new cabinets vs. the old floor. The floor installer wrapped up the project in a few hours with perfect precision.

We had to wait a while for the painter, but it was worth the wait. She smoothed out the rough spots, freshened up the trim and ceiling and put just the right paint color on the walls, finishing things off.

I am always in awe of people who are so good at construction crafts because I am not good at them at all. I admire their skill and agree with their vocational choice. What they do pleases not only the homeowner, but everyone who comes into that space.

Labor Day is just around the

corner and my summer of appreciating carpenters, plumbers, tile installers and painters and others reminded me of a prayer we often use on Labor Day: the prayer for Vocation in Daily Work. I pray this with all of the many people who transformed the kitchen in mind.

“Almighty God our heavenly Father, you declare your glory and show forth your handiwork in the heavens and in the earth: Deliver us in our various occupations from the service of self alone that we may do the work you give us to do in truth and beauty, and for the common good; for the sake of him who came among us as one who serves, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen”

As you rest from your labor on Labor Day weekend, give thanks with me for all those who offer their gifts and talents to enrich all of our lives as they go about their work.
